TREND FOR EGGS HELD UNCERTAIN; MAY TAKE DROP

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—(AP) The egg market had a very uncertain tone in today's trading. Even members of the trade found it difficult to get a line on conditions because of the many factors having an influence on the market.

Eastern and mid-west markets are being watched with more than usual interest because if prices drop there it is quite likely that a downward revision will be forced here.

The present market is characterized by a fixed relationship between price and supply that does not usually exist. The advance of prices in many important markets a few weeks ago is said to have been followed immediately by a decrease in consumption. Another factor that may weaken the mid-west market and, consequently, the market here, is the hot weather.

Decreases in quality may have been sufficient to stop the movement into the coolers. If this occurred, a large quantity of eggs will be thrown onto the fresh egg market and very likely cause a decline.

The trade is not predicting a decline, but anything may happen.

COUNTY LACKS FUND FOR SEED TESTING TRACT

C. C. Lemmon, David Rosenberg and Paul Scherer, a committee of fruitmen delegated to confer with the county court upon matters pertaining to the Southern Oregon Federal Experiment Orchard, held a short session with the county court this morning upon details of the new plan.

The county court refused to sanction purchase of 34 acres for the study of seed crops, etc., or to make provisions for the building of laboratory or housing space at this time, on the ground that no funds were available. The county court agreed to go ahead with the proposed purchase of 21 acres of orchard land, for experimental purposes, on the Williams Hedge tract, as soon as legal technicalities could be straightened out.

The county court informed the delegation that space could probably be arranged in the new court house for the federal orchard workers and that temporary quarters would have to suffice for the present.

\$15,000 Yearly The federal funds amounting to \$15,000 per year, a continuing

fund voted by the last session of congress, is now available.

The county has secured from the school district a small class room on the Washington school site, for use as offices for the architect, contractor, and clerk-of-the-works. It will eliminate the necessity of the county building a new structure.
