

Medford Juniors Drub Klamath for District Championship

LADS TO PLAY MARSHFIELD IN SUNDAY CLASH

Legion Proteges Take Free Hitting Game, 14 to 11 From Invaders—Tommy White Perfect at Bat

The Medford American Legion baseball team won the Southern Oregon district championship yesterday when they defeated Klamath Falls, 14 to 11, in a wild and wooly game. A handful of people saw the contest.

Medford scored four runs in the first inning and four more in the second, due to the wildness of Mackney, starting pitcher, and errors of judgment of the Pelican Juniors. With an eight-run lead the locals staged a similar exhibition in the fifth and sixth innings, and the score was tied when Catcher Harrington let two balls go away, and two runs came in to tie the score.

The locals went out and scored five more in the next inning, on hits and errors, and were never headed again, although the visitors threatened in nearly every inning.

Merritt was hit hard in the last inning, due to straining his side. Deering of Klamath Falls batted out a home run that scored two runs, but failed to touch third base and his stick work was nullified. There was quite an argument over this.

White Stars at Bat

The feature of the game was the stick work of Tommy White, who batted out a hit each time up, and a catch back of third base by Dick Lewis. The second base play of Reinking was also good.

The umpiring was a little off color at times, arousing the ire of the crowd, but on the whole it was passable.

Medford will leave Saturday night to play Marshfield next Sunday in an inter-sectional game at Marshfield.

The base running of the locals was poor, and it will have to improve if they get any place when they run up against real competition.

The Roosevelt highway, which winds through the wildest regions of the state, carries sportsmen today to an abundance of fish and game and is increasing in popularity each summer. Trout fishing is unusually good there and the beautiful scenery, adjacent to the highway, and the virgin forests, add much to the desirability of a trip down the coast road.

From July 1 on each season one of the best places for fishing is the mouth of the Umpqua. Here the silver side salmon run is on and that fish furnishes practically as much sport for anglers as the famed steelhead.

Anybody planning to make the trip is advised to stop at Lakeside, 25 miles above Marshfield. Ed Lewis runs a camp there and, acting as guide, takes many parties into wonderful fishing water. The fish caught in this territory average six pounds in weight and are found in numbers which startle fishermen on their first trip in.

Many forage their regular sportsman licenses, purchase commercial licenses, and catch tremendous amounts of fish. This unusually large run is found most often after September 1.

JEWISH GRAPPLER PINS CANTONWINE IN ROUGH TUSSELE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9.—(AP)—

Abe Kaplan, Jewish heavyweight wrestler from Montreal, who recently gave Gus Sonnenberg a very hectic session on this mat here, defeated Howard Cantonwine, Iowa, two out of three falls here last night in a rough and tumble affair. Cantonwine caught Kaplan off his guard to take the first fall in 17 seconds when he grabbed him with a double reverse wristlock, crashed him to the mat and straddled his body for the fall. Kaplan evened matters in 31 minutes 30 seconds with his own version of the flying mare. He repeated his specialty in two minutes to take the third and deciding fall. Kaplan weighed 225 pounds, Cantonwine 215.

Roland Kirchmeyer, former University of Oklahoma football star, took two out of three falls from Nino Darnello, Italy, using the flying scissors for both falls. Robin Reed and Ernie Arthur, middleweights, put on an interesting and lively tussle for two rounds, but Reed got his whip wristlock working in the third, and it was all over.

SENATORS FIND GROVE'S SLANTS HARD TO SOLVE

Mackmen Make It Two Out of Three to Continue Big Lead Over Field—Yanks Beat Red Sox Twice

Once again the Washington Senators have fired and fallen back, leaving the Athletics to sail serenely along toward their third straight title.

By turning back their most persistent rivals again yesterday, 6 to 3, the Mackmen made it two out of three for the series and extended their lead to six and a half games over the American league field. The prospect they will be overtaken now appears remote.

Connie Mack called on his great lefthander, Robert Moses Grove, to take the deciding game of the series and the slim portlander responded nobly to score his 17th victory of the campaign. The Senators pecked away at him for 11 hits, as many as the champions could get off four Washington pitchers, but they were helpless in the pinches. Twelve Senators were left on base.

Yanks Win Twice

Meanwhile the New York Yankees, with whom the Athletics open a three-game series at Yankee stadium today, were mowing down the Boston Red Sox in a double-header, 13 to 3 and 9 to 4, to climb within four and a half games of second place. Big Jim Weaver made his first start of the year in the first game and limited the Sox to nine hits, while Herb Pennock routed them in the second. Babe Ruth enjoyed a big day with his 21st home run and three singles.

The Cleveland Indians went 11 innings to defeat the Chicago White Sox in their opener, 10 to 6. Lyn Storti and Geo. Burns, two members of the St. Louis Browns' "pony" infield, starred as the Browns broke a three-game losing streak with a 7-to-1 triumph over Detroit.

National Race Wars

The National league race tightened as the New York Giants dropped a hard fought decision to the Phillies, 5 to 4. The Brooklyn Robins, held idle by rain at Boston, went into a virtual tie with the McGrawmen for second place, three percentage points back.

Heinie Meine, Pittsburgh right-hander, stopped the onrushing Chicago Cubs in their tracks when he held them to six hits and beat them 5 to 2. Meine had a shutout until two were out in the ninth, when hits by Hemsley and Grimm scored a pair of runs. The Pirates scored all their runs in the first two innings.
