PORTLAND, Ore., July 9.—(AP) The advance of one cent a pound in standard cube butter reflects a very firm market. The prices made effective for today's trading places standards and extras on the same level. Conditions within the butter market are such that another upward adjustment would not come as a surprise to members in the trade. A break in the weather may result in increased production but it will take quite a period of bearish weather to influence a market as strong as the present one. Receipts for the past two weeks have been no larger than actual dealer requirements. This goes to make a firm undertone.

Colorado Fruit Crop Looks Big

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo.—(UP)—A trainload of peaches more than 26 miles long will be shipped from Colorado's western slopes this fall, if the fruit forecasters are accurate. In addition, the region is expected to produce a record pear and apple crop.

Pallade, center of the peach growing territory, is expected to send 1800 cars of peaches to the market. North Fork will contribute 200 cars, and other points, 100 cars.

A total of \$85 cars of pears, more than three times the amount produced last year, was forecast this year. The apple crop will be 1855 cars, with Delta contributing two-thirds of that amount.

STATE LOSES BET TO WELL DRILLER

LEBANON, O.—(UP)—A. R. Posey, Cincinnati, well driller, has won his gamble with the state of Ohio and is richer by about \$1500.

Posey had submitted bids for drilling wells on a state farm, near here, but they had been rejected because it was claimed they were too high. Successful contractors had drilled four times to depths of 140 feet and had found no water.

When Posey offered to gamble that if he failed to produce a well giving 50 gallons of water a minute he would ask no pay, he was given a chance.

He picked his own location and drilled for two weeks, at the end of which time he struck water at a depth of 137 feet. The well yielded 400 gallons a minute for 60 hours.
