

REFUEL FOR FLIGHT O'ER BERING SEA

Tokyo-Bound Texans Contact Nurse Ship Above Nome and Nose Into Cloud Bank for Long Hop—Weather Bad in Alaska

NOME, Alaska, July 9.—(AP)—Greeted by the worst weather they have thus far experienced on their non-stop refueling flight attempt from Seattle to Tokyo, Reg. L. Robbins and Harold S. Jones took on additional gasoline over here at 3:30 a. m. (P.S.T.), and headed into a cloud bank over Bering sea.

The Fort Worth was refueled over Solomon before the contact here and Pilot Jimmie Mattern of the tri-motored mother ship set down to load for a refueling contact over the Bering Sea or Siberia.

Two refueling contacts were made between Solomon and Fairbanks as the planes were slowed by poor visibility with clouds pressing the ceiling low.

Weather Improving. Although clouds were hanging to the west tips as the Fort Worth headed westward, the weather was improving.

The Fort Worth, with the mother ship hovering near her, appeared over Nome at 2:10 a. m. (P.S.T.). The tri-motored plane landed at Solomon at 2:15 a. m. and was off again at 2:45 for the refueling contact over that village.

Mattern set his big ship down here at 3 a. m. for another load of gasoline before he took off, and Nick Green, with Mattern, dropped the transfer hose to the Tokyo-bound pair.

Take on New Load. As the Fort Worth headed westward, the mother ship settled to the field here and mechanics immediately began loading her with gasoline for the trip over the Bering Sea and Siberia.

Mattern said he was not sure where the next refueling contact would be made, or when.

She was a native of Birmingham, England, and came to Wisconsin with her parents when she was 10 years old. The family came to The Dalles in 1865. She was the widow of William Mitchell, pioneer wagon maker. Her husband's brother, John Mitchell, was a widely known pioneer editor here.

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of the Medford people was expressed by other members of the group, who joined Mr. Kershaw in demanding that all facts be placed before the public.

H. E. Harder, president of the First National bank, speaking for the Chamber of Commerce, told the two groups, "I'm for it. I do not like to see more bonds floated at this time, but the condition under the present system is so terrible we have to build the sewer to maintain our self-respect as a municipality."

Favored Veto

The attitude of the Chamber of Commerce board in advocating a postponement of the election was explained by W. S. Bolger, who assured the council that the action was taken only because the chamber feared that the people at this time would not support the bond issue. The need for distribution of more information was also emphasized by Mr. Bolger.

The demands of the state health department were presented by Dr. L. D. Inskeep, who assured council and chamber that the "department means business" and will not await action from Medford any longer. The typhoid epidemic, which arises each fall, was accredited to the stretch of Bear creek, which increases with the lowering of the water line. There are now four cases of typhoid, Dr. Inskeep informed his audience, and people living in the Bear creek district have a justifiable right to sue the city of Medford.

Dangers Cited

Dangers from impending cuts were reviewed by City Attorney Frank Farrell, who with Dr. Inskeep referred to LaGrande and Walla Walla, two cities which paid out \$25,000 and \$28,000 in damages before bond issues for new sewage systems were carried.

The tax levy in Medford was compared with that of other cities by C. A. Meeker, vice-mayor, who showed that Medford is in a position to easily care for the bond issue to be voted on.

The motion for endorsement of the bond issue by the Chamber of Commerce board was put by J. C. Mann.

PROPOSE UNIT HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTIVES

State Board of Control Delays Construction New Structure for Investigation of New System

SALEM, Ore., July 9.—(AP)—Investigation of the state tuberculosis hospital with a view of possible establishment of a unit system at a better location than the one now used, and a policy opposed to state operation of farms other than for reformatory or curative employment of various institutions were effected at the meeting of the state board of control today.

The proposed investigation of the tuberculosis situation again delayed the construction of the new structure for which the state legislature appropriated \$90,000. Orders had been previously issued to advertise for bids on revised specifications, and the original bids had been declared too high.

Propose Survey

Governor Julius L. Meier proposed to the board that a committee of experts be named to investigate the hospital at Salem, and should this committee recommend the removal of the old structure now being used, action would be taken to present the matter to the legislature. A report from the committee would be given at the earliest possible moment. The motion was passed by the board.

The present structure was declared a fire hazard and inadequate for hospitalization work. Cottages adjoining are used to house many of the patients.

Hal E. Hess, secretary of state opposed the resolution on the grounds that economy was not considered in the operation of institutional farms. He suggested that farms be operated with the dual purpose of economy and curative employment. His suggestion was rejected. The policy was approved, with Hess voting against.

OLSON PROMOTED IN OREGON GUARD RANKS

WASHINGTON, July 9.—(AP)—Rear Admiral Joseph N. Hemphill, retired veteran of the Civil and Spanish-American wars, is dead here at the age of 84. A native of Ripley, Ohio, Admiral Hemphill was one of the last of the old line naval officers.

GIBSON NAMED FOR DRAFTING OF DEBT PLAN

Ambassador to Belgium Will Serve As Observer—German Banker Seeks Huge Loan of Long Duration

WASHINGTON, July 9.—(AP)—President Hoover today designated Hugh S. Gibson, American ambassador to Belgium, as American representative on the experts committee which will work out details of the intergovernmental debt moratorium.

Acting Secretary Castle of the state department, in announcing the designation, said the ambassador would serve as an observer.

Frederick Livesey, reparations expert of the state department, will be sent to London to assist Gibson. Castle expressed the opinion a satisfactory arrangement would be found for the suspension of Germany's conditional reparations payments due July 15, so that na-

tion would not be considered technically in default of its debts.

LONDON, July 9.—(AP)—Hans Luther, head of the German Reichsbank, paid a flying visit to London today and after a two-hour conference with the ambassador at the German embassy, left for Paris.

His visits here brought no statement from any of the officials concerned, but it was understood that Dr. Luther is visiting the financial centers in an effort to negotiate a long term credit of between \$250,000,000 and \$400,000,000 to shore up Germany's financial structure, weakened by heavy foreign withdrawals in the past two weeks.

WATER GLADDENS MOSIER DISTRICT

THE DALLES, Ore., July 9.—(AP)—The Mosier fruit district was made jubilant today when an arctic well came in, flowing the largest volume of any well in the mid-Columbia district.

The water, which spouts four feet above the four-inch casing, was tapped at 80 feet, the last 20 feet being through hard basalt. The well is on the N. R. Brooks ranch and was intended for orchard irrigation but it may be purchased by the city of Mosier for domestic use and fire protection.

GIRDLER MAKES HAPPY LANDING IN HOME STATE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 9.—(AP)—Undeterred by an accident in landing here late yesterday, Mrs. Wiley Post and Mrs. Harold Gatty, wives of the round-the-world fliers, hopped off for Chickasha, Okla., at 9 o'clock this morning.

The women escaped serious injury last night when their plane ground-looped and was badly damaged. A sister ship of the "Winnie Mae," the round-the-world plane, took the women westward.

It was rushed here last from Indianapolis by Pilots Ard Knox and Dan McDuffie.
