

### IT'S UP TO YOU, DECLARES JUDGE SENTENCING LAD

Victor C. Marcelle, 15, the "cigarette pistol bandit," was remanded to the state industrial school at Salem late yesterday, before Juvenile Court Judge Alex Sparrow. Marcelle will be 15 on July 18th next, and is above the average in intelligence.

"The court doesn't like to send a great-appearing and mentally keen boy like you to the training school," the court told Marcelle. "but we have some boys around here who are reading about you. If the court pardoned you, they might get the impression they could get away with the same thing. The crimes were committed in Jackson county, and the county has a responsibility to uphold. You got out of a boy's class when you started holding up service stations."

Marcelle asked the court to parole him to his mother, who sat weeping in court. "If you lived here, there might be a chance for a parole," the court ruled, "but your mother lives in Portland, and we would have no jurisdiction." The court reminded the lad that he had left school despite his mother's objections, and "she couldn't do anything with you." The court admonished Marcelle that his future rested with himself. "It's all up to you. If you behave yourself and show that you are trying to do right, you will get a 'break.' If you don't, it will be just too bad."

### LANE COUNTY ROAD MAY NOW PROCEED

EUGENE, Ore., July 10.—(AP)—J. P. Christie and his swamill near Bushman constituted an obstacle to Lane county's road building program. The right-of-way ran through Christie's mill and he refused to accept \$8000 for the property from the county, holding out for \$15,000. Last Saturday, the county court learned today, the mill was destroyed by fire. Now all the county has to do is buy the lease on the ground, since Christie didn't own the property.

### COPCO EMPLOYING HOME LABOR FOR PROSPECT FLUME

Close to 700 men are now employed on the Prospect tunnel and flume project of the California Oregon Power company, and a recapitulation of the workers shows that only six are non-residents of Jackson, Josephine or Klamath counties. A large proportion are married, have families and are taxpayers.

A check up of the autos showing ten with foreign licenses, was made by the power concern, and it was revealed that eight of these belonged to tourists and one to a resident of Jackson county who journeyed to Montana last winter and is trying to use up his Montana license.

It is expected that the laboring force will be increased soon, in order to complete as much of the work as possible before winter sets in. The work will be carried on as long as weather conditions will permit.

The woods adjacent to the work are full of campers, and include many local families who are enjoying the novelty of tent life in the open.
