EGAN JOINS WEST GOLF MEET ACES

Pairings for Qualifying Rounds Monday and Tuesday Made—National And Coast Stars to Compete Coming Week at Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11.—(AP)—Golfers here for the Western Golf association's annual tournament had the opportunity today to try the tournament tees, opened to the players for the first time.

The Portland Golf club course, where the tournament will be played, has been closed to all but tournament players for several days and will remain closed until the end of the tournament.

Pairings for the qualifying rounds Monday and Tuesday were arranged by tournament officials today.

Players already on the grounds include Johnny Lehman, Chicago, the defending champion; Charley Dawson and Babe Blinnig, Chicago; Francis Brown, Hawaii; Chuck Hunter, Tacoma; Dr. O. F. Seaver, Los Angeles; H. Chandler Egan, Medford; Robert Watson, Spokane; A. G. Sato, San Francisco; Charles Becka, Chicago; Dr. John M. Johnston, Seattle; Bill Robinson, Seattle; Abel Larson, Salt Lake City; and George Shaw, Los Angeles.

In addition to the better known players, many of Oregon's and Washington's best golfers have entered the tournament. Among the outstanding Portland players new to the western amateur tournament is Tab Boyer, civic champion.

BRITISH GOLFER HOLDS HAGEN TO TIE AT TORONTO

MISSISSAUGA COUNTRY CLUB, Toronto, Ont., July 11.—(AP)—Clipping four strokes from par on the last nine holes, Percy Alliss, British pro at the exclusive Wannock club in Berlin, posted a 76 in the fourth round of the Canadian open golf championship today to tie the old master, Walter Hagen, at 282 and force a playoff for the title.

The playoff, at 29 holes, will be held Tuesday.

Hagen, whose pair of 68s had given him the lead after 36 holes and who still was in front after 54 holes, faltered on his final round when he needed 74 for a grand total of 282.

Alliss, three strokes behind the leader at the start of the final 18 hole round, apparently shot himself out of the championship picture on the first nine when he used up 29 strokes. At this stage of the game he trailed the leading Hagen by six strokes. But the Briton pulled himself together at the turn and negotiated the final nine holes in 32 for a 71 that beat par by one stroke and, more to the point, put him in a tie for the championship.

With Alliss and Hagen in a tie, Johnny Farrell, smiling Irishman from Manaroneck, N. Y., still was out on the fairway and in a position to overhaul both of the leaders. Johnny had taken 37 for his first nine of the final round and a 25 on the incoming nine would give him a tie with Alliss and Hagen and 34 would beat them both.

But the birdies wouldn't click for Farrell when he needed 27 for a 64 to tie the other two. He made 28-73 and 282, good for third place.

Mortie Dutra, of Los Angeles, who gained fourth place with 284, played the best golf of the day, clipping two strokes off par with a 70 in the third round and winding up with a spectacular 68 in the final 18 holes. Two strokes less of Dutra in fifth place was the defending champion, Tommy Armour of Detroit, British open champion. A pair of 73s today boosted Armour's total to 285.

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 11.—(AP)—Three new northwest records were established in the first day events of the fifth annual Pacific Northwest Archery association's tournament which opened here today. Seattle and Portland archers won major honors.

Four northwest records were hung up in the men's women's and junior flight events. Distance in both the men's and women's flights exceeded the present national records but will not displace them.

Homer Prouty, Portland, shot his arrow 415 yards, 1 foot, 9 inches for the new men's flight record, while Mrs. Prouty, his wife, raised the women's flight record to 229 yards, 1 foot, 11 inches, a new record. The new junior flight record was made by Ralph Calvey, Portland, at 343 yards, 1 foot, 11 inches.

The Lockleys archers, Seattle, won the team championship for the third consecutive year with a score of 1816. The victory gave them permanent possession of the Finch Haggard trophy.

Portland won the women's team shoot.

Grover Goutcher, Corvallis, made high individual score in the team shoot with 230. E. M. Stamps and S. B. Hayden, both Seattle, tied for second with 228. Mrs. D. T. Chase, Portland, with 491 was high individual scorer among the women.

The association's annual banquet was held tonight. The tournament will continue tomorrow.

TILDEN TO PLAY WILLIAMS TODAY FOR WORLD TITLE

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., July 11.—(AP)—William Tatem Tilden II, and Vincent Richards, tennis rivals of long standing, will meet tomorrow on the center court of Forest Hills stadium for the professional tennis championship of the United States.

Richards defeated today Karl Kossuth, European champion, 6-2, 6-4, 6-3 and Tilden romped to victory over Howard Kinsley of San Francisco 6-4, 6-0, 6-2.

GRID MENTOR OF STANFORD VISITS LAKE AND PRINK

Another successful season is seen on the football horizon by Glenn S. (op) Warner, Stanford University football coach, a visitor in the Crater Lake national park Friday while on a vacation trip destined to take him as far north as Glacier park in the next four weeks. Mr. Warner was accompanied to the lake by C. E. Thornhill, first assistant coach.

The Stanford mentor has the lineup for the forthcoming football season well in mind and will include quite a number of new faces due to the graduation last year of several players and development of others who had been substitutes last season. He views the University of Southern California as the strongest contender for the coast championship. He doubts if the Washington State college, conference champions last year, will have much to offer this season due to the loss of most of its players by graduation.

Pop Warner has high regard for the ability of the Oregon State college and the University of Oregon teams, but failed to comment on the University of Washington or the University of California. Stanford is looking forward to its game with Oregon State as a hard battle and feels that Coach Schiller has some plays to spring. Stanford also has games scheduled with Dartmouth and Minnesota.

While in the park, Mr. Warner visited Frank Callison, freshman football coach for the University of Oregon, now acting as summer park ranger. The Stanford mentor has heard of the Oregon coach's record at the university as well as at the Medford high school, where he completed several seasons without a defeat.

Mr. Warner had been planning to visit Crater Lake for several seasons and was deeply interested in the geological history of the lake. He also expressed interest in fishing, especially when he learned Crater Lake is heavily stocked with rainbow trout.

French Honor Californian PARIS, July 11.—(UP)—When the French government decorated Charles Storrer Stearns, of Pasadena, Calif., with the Legion of Honor, it was the only time that an American had ever been so decorated in the Louvre Museum.
