PRISON SENTENCE AWAITS BENNETT IN ASSAULT CASE

Frank Bennett, logger and married man, found guilty by a jury Saturday night, after nearly eight hours deliberation, of a statutory offense involving a 15 year old high school girl, will be sentenced a week from today by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton. The law provides a prison term of not less than three year, nor more than 20 years.

Richard Fritz, companion of Bennett on the "petting party" last March, found guilty of a misdemeanor charge, as a result of the same escapade, will be sentenced at the same time. Fritz has been in jail for several weeks.

Attorney Thomas J. Enright, representing Bennett, announced Saturday night shortly after the verdict was returned, that an appeal to the state supreme court would be taken in Bennett's behalf.

The jury stood 9 to 3, during the first half of the balloting, and 12 to 2 during the latter half, according to courthouse reports. It was also reported that one juror held out for acquittal. There were three women on the jury. One objection advanced was that Bennett was indicted on a lesser count than Fritz. T. E. Daniels of this city was foreman. The jury was polled by request of the defense.

Bennett did not wince during the reading of the verdict, but when he later met his loyal wife, burst into tears and wept bitterly.

According to the testimony, Bennett and Fritz induced the complaining witness and another high school girl of tender years, to journey with them in a coupe to the cabin of Augustus Wilson near Ruch, where they procured liquor. This occurred on the evening of March 11 last. They planned to return to their wives, and with the girls held a card party. An auto mishap delayed their return, and Bennett, it was testified, drank freely.

The party returned to the Fritz cabin, between Medford and Gold Hill, about midnight. Fritz took the second girl home, and returned first leaving Bennett and the complaining witness alone.

Relatives of the girl started an investigation following her all night absence, and presented the matter to the district attorney.

Augustus Wilson, an aged man, awaits trial for alleged offering of intoxicating liquor to a minor. Neither girl drank.
