

# Pringle Wins Cup in Medford Links Spring Handicap Play

## WILCOX GIVES TOUGH BATTLE IN FINAL ROUND

Sparkling Golf Characterizes Match — Winner Cards 72 And 74 Against 78-79 For Runner-Up.

The best brand of golf ever shown in a local tournament, was displayed at the Medford club yesterday when in a 36-hole match H. H. Pringle won the championship cup in the men's spring handicap, by defeating Lyle Wilcox, four up and three to go.

Not only was the match nip and tuck throughout, but both men shot a par brand of golf, Pringle a 72 and 74; Wilcox a 78 and 79. In fact after such a showing for a long match, friends of both men are regretting they couldn't have entered the western amateur, in Portland, where such scores would certainly have placed them in the running.

Pringle Holds Lead Although the match was close, and Wilcox with his advantage of a four stroke handicap on each 18, was always a threat, he never was able to get in the lead. Pringle being two up on the first 18 and four on the 36. But the latter had to sustain his par and hole shooting throughout to do it, and the former would have been slaughtered if he had not been able to stand the gaff and answer Hank's screams with his own.

The new and less capricious ball that has given major league pitchers a new lease on life this season, evidently is losing its magic qualities as the sun beams stronger and the batters begin to reach their top form. The doctored sphere was forced to take a luster beating over the week end.

Hitting predominated in almost every instance yesterday as 14 contests were unreeled in the two circuits, including a full set of doubleheaders in the National. Only 10 pitchers out of 28 who started were able to go the distance. Thirty runs crossed the plate in one tilt, 23 in another and 19 in a third.

Cardinals Get 21 Hits. The Chicago Cubs and St. Louis Cardinals gave the day's most boisterous exhibition in the second game of the pair, the Cards pounding six Cub pitchers for 21 hits and a 17 to 13 victory. Chicago captured the first tilt, 7 to 5, largely the result of home-runs by Hack Wilson and Hazen Cuyler.

The crippled New York Giants took two free-hitting contests from the Phillies, 13 to 6 and 9 to 4, to pick up a full game on the Cards. Cincinnati's last place Reds came back after five straight defeats to sweep their holiday bill with the Pittsburgh Pirates, 14 to 7, in the opener, and 6 to 5 in the 11-inning nightcap.

The Robins downed the Boston Braves 7 to 4 in their first, but the Braves fought 12 innings to win the added attraction 4 to 3. A's Take Two. A pair of Connie Mack's second line pitchers, Watie Hoyt and Leroy Mahaffey, gave the Athletics a clean sweep over the Boston Red Sox, 7 to 2 and 6 to 2. The two wins enabled the leaders to pick up a game and a half on the second place Washington Senators, who were tamed by the Yankee veteran, Herb Pennek, 10 to 4, in a single game at Washington.

Cleveland and Chicago divided their American league doubleheader, the Indians winning the first, behind Wes Ferrell's steady pitching, 10 to 4, but losing the nightcap, 7 to 5. Elton Hunslett of the Detroit Tigers gave the day's best pitching exhibition when he held the St. Louis Browns to four hits and beat them, 7 to 2.

Eagle Point defeated Talent 6 to 4 yesterday at Eagle Point, in the only game of the Rogue River valley, before a good sized crowd. The game was close throughout and both teams played good ball.

The Medford American Legion baseball team won the championship of district No. 4 yesterday at Marshfield when they defeated Marshfield, 5 to 4, in 10 innings before a record crowd of Coos Bay fans, who cheered impartially.
