## VOTERS GET CITY SEWER FACTS, NEED

### Mass Meeting Reveals Necessity For Action Now To Relieve Dangerous Conditions—State Sanitary Engineer Emphatic.

For tomorrow afternoon's special election on the sewer bond question the polls will be open from 1 p. m. to 8 p. m., and all regularly registered citizens are entitled to vote. The voting places are as follows:

**First Ward:** Public market building on South Riverside avenue.

**Second Ward:** Public library on West Main street.

**Third Ward:** Fichtner's garage corner Fifth and Sixth streets.

**Fourth Ward:** Upstairs city hall, corner Front and Sixth streets.

The populace of Medford is better informed today on the merits of the bond issues to be voted on tomorrow afternoon for a new sewerage disposal system and trunk sewer because of the mass meeting held in the city park last night, attended by hundreds of citizens to hear the talks of city officials and State Sanitary Engineer Carl E. Green on the present deplorable sewerage situation and why the voters should vote for the bond issue.

The talks were interspersed with selections by the Elks band, and the remarks and music were broadcast over KMED, thus carrying into the homes of many more citizens the sewerage situation and bond issue information. Many neighborhood radio parties were held to listen in.

The speakers in the order named were as follows: Mayor E. M. Wilson; W. W. Allen, chairman of the city council health committee; C. A. Meeker, chairman of the council finance committee; City Engineer Fred Scheffel; Dr. L. D. Inskeep, city health officer; and Carl E. Green, state sanitary engineer.

Each speaker covered briefly one phase of the situation, and probably the most informative address was that of Sanitary Engineer Green on the necessity for the sewerage disposal system to eliminate what he declared to be a "gross nuisance and public health hazard."

**Mayor's Opening Address**

"Many of the citizens of Medford have been led to believe that the matter of sewerage disposal for the city has not been given sufficient study and that action should be delayed. We are forced to immediate action," said Mayor Wilson.

"Let me say that this subject has been considered by your councils for years past without definite action, and that two years ago, former Mayor Pipes, myself and others visited Klamath Falls for inspection of that plant and system costing over \$200,000, going into detail with their engineer, Mr. Kennedy. Our study of the problem has continued since that time and has been intensive since the present council assumed their duties in January.

"One of the first communications received by me in entering upon my duties as mayor was from the state board of health, being advised that something must be done to correct Medford's sewer situation.

"Realizing the seriousness of the matter, our health committee, with W. W. Allen as chairman, has made a thorough investigation; has worked out all preliminary details in accordance with requirements of the state board of health at little cost to the city; has submitted the preliminary details and specifications to four different engineers, including Mr. Kennedy of San Francisco, Pierce, Greeley & Hansen of Chicago, and Burns, McDonald & Smith of Los Angeles. These engineers have approved our tentative plans and estimates.

"When the bond issue has been authorized, and I am sure it will be next Wednesday, we will be in

## ROTARY VOTES SEATTLE OUSTS APPROVAL FOR EDWARDS FROM SEWAGE BONDS MAYOR'S CHAIR

Speakers Give Facts And Recall Held Vindication J. D. Ross, Discharged City Light Head—Council To Name Successor Soon.

SEATTLE, July 14.—(AP) Seattle's "business man mayor," Frank Edwards, elected as a political unknown in 1928 to succeed Bertha K. Landes, stood retired today by a decisive majority by way of the recall route.

In a recent election which grew out of incompetency charges following his dismissal of the head of the city light department, the voters yesterday ousted him from office. An unofficial count of the vote was: For recall 35,637; against 21,836.

Today, with President Robert Harlan of the city council in charge of the city's affairs pending an election of a successor by the council, the reappointment of J. D. Ross, ousted city light head, and reorganization of the board of public works loomed in the near future.

**Confidence in Ross**

Harlan said after the election last night he construed it to mean a repudiation of the Edwards administration and a "vote of confidence" in Ross.

"I believe the vote must be interpreted as calling," he added, "not merely for the reinstatement of Mr. Ross, but for a complete reorganization of the board of public works."

Ross, who since his dismissal in March has served as a consultant for New York state in the projected St. Lawrence river power development, returned here 10 days ago to work actively for the retirement of the mayor, Ross had been with the city light, publicly owned utility, more than a quarter of a century.

"The Seattle situation will have tremendous results," he said last night.

"The success of the recall serves notice on friends and foes of public ownership that Seattle is definitely committed to protection and progress for its city owned utility."

The choosing of a new mayor devolves upon the city council, which must act within 20 days.

## FOUR GOLD HILL STORES ENTERED

Money was the objective of the robbers as they failed to take food, clothing, cigarettes or candy. The sheriff's office investigated this morning and came to the conclusion that the "jobs were the work of auto bums."

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 14.—(AP) State Senator B. L. Eddy of Roseburg was today selected by Presbyterians of Oregon as moderator for the coming year.

The selection was made at the opening synod, now convened for the 41st annual conference on the Oregon State college campus. Eddy succeeds the Rev. Donald W. H. MacClure of Portland.

Other officers chosen at the opening session included Rev. N. T. Mitchelmore, Ashland, vice-moderator.

## PARIS TO TOKYO FLIGHT ENDS IN SIBERIAN CRASH

MOSCOW, July 14.—(AP) Joseph Lebric and the two French fliers who started with him from Paris on a non-stop flight to Tokyo are waiting in the middle of Siberia today for another ship to bring them back to Moscow.

Their ambitious project ended last night in disaster when something went wrong with their plane "The Hypphen" and the three of them—Lebric, Marcel Doret and Rieck Alouin, their mechanic—bailed out in parachutes and landed on a rocky slope in the west Sayan mountains, about half way between Paris and Tokyo.

The place where they landed is so remote from civilization that only the most meagre details of the accident have been received. Its cause is not known.

## HAGEN WINS TITLE IN CANADIAN PLAY

MISSISSAUGA COUNTRY CLUB, Toronto, Ont., July 14.—(AP)—Walter Hagen, Detroit, today won the Canadian open golf championship, defeating Percy Allis of Berlin in a 36-hole playoff.

Trailing by a single stroke at the end of nine, 18 and 27 holes, Hagen rallied on the last nine to beat out the British pro by one stroke. "The boys tied at 282 in the regular 72 holes of the championship last Saturday.

Hagen's score for the 36 holes was 141; Allis' 142.

## Lion Grabbed By Tongue, Claims Rhodesia Rancher; "Oh, Y-e-a," Say Experts

LIVINGSTONE, Rhodesia, July 14.—(AP)—Attacked by a wounded lion which had set upon him in the jungle a rancher named Glemann seized the beast's tongue and held on until a friend killed the lion with a rifle.

Glemann said he had set a trap for the lion after it had made depredations upon his stock. A trap gun wounded it and Glemann followed the spoor into the forest. He came unexpectedly upon the beast and it sprang upon him.

His cries brought Lovatt Campbell, an Englishman, who dispatched the lion with the last cartridge in his gun. Glemann had been severely mauled but will recover.

NEW YORK, July 14.—(AP)—Zoological experts here were inclined to smile at the story from Rhodesia of the rancher who held a lion by the tongue until a companion shot the beast, but they wouldn't go so far as to say it was impossible.

Dr. William Reid Blair, pathologist at the Bronx Zoo, said a lion's tongue afforded but little grasping surface and that little was very slippery.

"The story from Rhodesia sounds just about as slippery as a lion's tongue," he said, "but I wouldn't say flatly that it could not be true.

## General Moratorium Effective Until Thursday In Effort to Tide Institutions Over Until Arrival of Help From Abroad.

(By the Associated Press) Germany has declared what amounts to a general moratorium of banking operations, closing all banks except the Reichsbank until Thursday and perhaps longer. It was a precautionary measure, a temporary effort to tide the institutions over until help comes from abroad.

The world bank is willing to renew a \$100,000,000 credit due on Thursday and it is understood the Bank of France and the Federal Reserve bank of New York which participated in the credit also will grant an extension of their part of the total. The Bank of England has not yet replied.

Reaction outside of Germany to the collapse of the Darmstadt-Und National bank has caused the temporary closing of all the banks in Hungary, and suspension of the Mercur bank at Vienna, a subsidiary of the Darmstadt. At Jassy, Rumania, the Dacla bank has closed with a \$1,000,000 deficit.

## C.-C. DIRECTORS FAVOR SEWAGE BOND ISSUANCE

The \$225,000 bond issue for provision of a new sewer system in Medford, to be voted on tomorrow, was endorsed last night by the board of directors of the chamber of commerce in regular session, and plans for sending delegates to a meeting called by Governor Meier for July 22 discussed.

The meeting, called for the purpose of developing plans to increase sales of Oregon made products in this state, will be attended by Medford representatives, O. O. Alendorfer, president of the local chamber, announced this afternoon, but delegates have not yet been appointed.

It is Governor Meier's belief, according to the letter received by the local chamber that an additional \$25,000,000 worth of locally made products could easily be sold if the right campaign were inaugurated. This would mean a great increase in payrolls and would relieve unemployment. The governor wishes to confer with representatives of all sections of the state regarding the matter. The meeting will be held in Salem.

To Attend Breakfast J. C. Thompson and W. W. Allen were appointed at last night's meeting to attend the breakfast to be given in Klamath Falls tomorrow morning, honoring the house and sub-committee on appropriations of the interior department. The congressional party will arrive in Klamath Falls this evening. Following the breakfast at the Willard hotel tomorrow morning a trip to Crater Lake will be enjoyed.

It was also decided at last night's meeting to invite the 1932 convention of Spanish-American War Veterans to meet in Medford.
