JACKSON COUNTY JUDGE AFFIRMED BY HIGHER COURT

The state supreme court today handed down the following opinions on Jackson county cases:
Hiram and Pauline Meader vs. Farmers' Mutual Fire Relief association, appellants; appeal from Jackson county. Suit to recover on fire insurance policy. Opinion by Justice Kelly, Judge H. D. Norton affirmed.
Eagle Point Irrigation District, appellant, vs. G. E. Cowden and others; appeal from Jackson county. Suit to foreclose certain delinquent tax certificates. Opinion by Justice Bell, Judge H. D. Norton affirmed with modifications.
In the Meader suit, the insurance company took the position that, inasmuch as no notice had been given of the sale of a house on "Millionaire Row" to B. J. Palmer, the \$2000 insurance policy was void. Meader, through his attorney, Porter J. Neff, contended that the policy was in effect inasmuch as he held a mortgage, and was upheld.
In the Eagle Point Irrigation district suit the question involved was the precedence of delinquent tax certificates over state land board claims. Inasmuch as the opinion of Circuit Judge Norton was affirmed with modifications, the true import of the decision will not be known until the full text of the modifications are received.
