Soldier's Teeth
Land in Gullet
Causing Death

WASHINGTON, July 15.—
(AP)—Private Olaf Nelson of
Fort Bliss, Texas, died at Wal-
ter Reed hospital early today
after five unsuccessful at-
tempts to extract from his
esophagus artificial teeth he
swallowed last Saturday.
The 30-year-old soldier, who
was rushed across a country
in an army airplane in a race
against death, died at 7
o'clock from suffocation. He
had rallied from the fifth
probing for the dental bridge
which caught in his throat
while eating breakfast at the
Texas army post, and at 4 a.
m. was believed better than at
any time since he arrived here
late yesterday.

COUNTY CANNOT
LEASE BUILDING
AS COURTHOUSE

SALEM, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—
Deschutes county cannot enter into
a lease jointly with the city of
Bend for a courthouse and city
hall, the Oregon supreme court
held today in reversing the decree
of the lower court which dismissed
the injunction against the county
and city restraining them from en-
tering such contract.

The proposal presented by Phil
Brooks, was that he would con-
struct a building for the county
and city, in return for a monthly
rental of \$750 for 17 1/2 years, with
option to buy.

In the opinion of Justice Ros-
man, it was held such a lease was
unlawful, because the money in-
volved exceeded the voluntary
limit of indebtedness of county and
city.

FALL TO ENTER
WESTERN JAIL
AS HEALTH AID

Sentence Changed To Year
And Day Giving Pen
Designation Right—Can
Be Paroled In 4 Months.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—(AP)—
A ruling that Albert B. Fall should
serve his sentence for bribery in the
New Mexico state penitentiary
was handed down today by At-
torney General Mitchell.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—(AP)—
Albert B. Fall's jail sentence of a
year and a day to enable him to serve
his time in a western prison.
Justice Bailey suggested last
week that the motion be made to
enable Fall to serve his sentence
in a climate more suitable to his
health than that of Washington
since the man is a victim of latent
tuberculosis. To do this it was
necessary to make the sentence
longer than a year, thus enabling
the attorney general to designate
the prison.

Details Near Finish
The few remaining details nec-
essary to send Fall to jail were
expected to be finished within the
next two or three days.

Under the new sentence Fall will
become eligible to parole in four
months, but the fact that his fine
of \$100,000 has not been paid
would require an additional thirty
days of service if he should take
a pauper's oath, instead of paying
the fine.

The change in the sentence will
not deprive Fall of his citizenship,
although he will probably lose his
civil rights in New Mexico.

CORVALLIS RADIO

SALEM, Ore., July 15.—(AP) For-
mal request to the federal radio
