

# MOUNTAIN PENS EXPLODE WHEN FOUND IN MAIL

### Officials Seek to Trace Plotters Who Sent Infernal Machines to Leaders Fascist Regime

GENOVA, Italy, July 16.—(AP)—The remaining of two fascist officers by the explosion of "mail or mountain pens" caused authorities to mobilize political police to search for the perpetrators.

A bombing plot against leaders of the regime was said to have been discovered several days ago, when officials traced the instigators of the infernal machines. Postal authorities were working on the case in the hope of finding a clue in the names of the victims.

The victims were injured when unexploded packages mailed last night. Cleverly disguised mountain pens, the bombs exploded in the hands and caused severe wounds. A bomb exploded on the docks earlier in the day, but no one was hurt.

Fascist leaders were warned not to open mailed packages, but to turn them to police headquarters for examination.

The president will take no action on the clemency petition until after the department of justice has studied it and made recommendations.

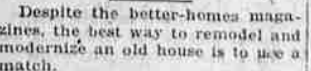

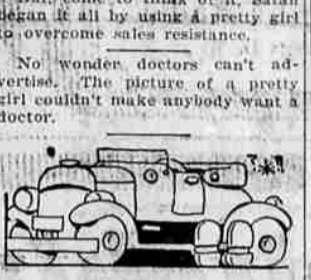

# PRESSURE TESTS FOR PEARS FREE AS SEASON NEAR

The nearness of the pear harvesting season is brought to mind by the fact that testing of pears for maturity by means of the pressure tester will start in the county agent's office July 29, according to an announcement today by County Agent L. P. Wilcox.

This service is free and the pear grower, he says, can well afford to make use of this means to determine approximately their picking dates.

The pressure test used in making maturity determination was worked out by the Oregon Experiment station and is considered the most reliable method of telling when they should be picked in order to obtain maximum quality, he further relates, and then gives the following directions to the growers:

"Select 10 to 12 specimens of healthy, normal fruit coming from several trees, so that the sample will represent an average for the entire crop. This should be done in the early morning while the fruit is cool. Bring the sample in for testing as soon after picking as possible. The test will then tell you where you stand."
