GRAND JURY TO PROBE HEALTH UNIT SITUATION

Charges Growing Out of Discharge of Mrs. King Will Be Eyed Next Week—Many Other Matters

The grand jury, of which Grover C. Corum is foreman, is scheduled to meet next week, and among the matters scheduled to be presented to the inquisitorial body are cattle hi-jacking on the ranges of eastern Jackson county, charges against the Jackson county health unit, growing out of the discharge of Mrs. Lydia King as a nurse, the alleged shooting in the leg of John Waskorika, an Evans creek miner, by Elan Huls and wife, during the course of a neighborhood fracas a month ago, a non-support case, and a number of minor matters.

For several weeks rumors and counter rumors have been flying about the county health unit situation. Mrs. Glendora M. Blakely, state superintendent of county nurses for the state board of health, conferred this morning with the county court.

An audit of the books of the health unit is being made for presentation to the grand jury, and thorough airing of the case is expected, "in order that the atmosphere be cleared." No formal charges have been filed with the district attorney's office.
