WIDOW SHOTS BOARDER WHEN HAND SPURNED

Portland Pair Found Dead in Basement—Gallon of Wine Beside Bodies—Note Asks Forgiveness

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17.—(AP)—Both dead from bullet wounds, the bodies of Mrs. Effie Fuller, 54, and Gus Johnson, about 40, were found in the basement of Mrs. Fuller's home here today.

The note found near the bodies said: "Please forgive me, dear neighbors and friends. You don't know what I have suffered the last three years. Call F. G. Keys and he will call his mother. God and all of you please forgive me, Effie."

The note was written on the back of an envelope addressed to Mrs. Fuller from F. E. Gage of Florence, Ore.

Police learned that Keys, mentioned in the note, is the dead woman's nephew.

Neighbors told police Mrs. Fuller had for several months been trying to get Johnson to marry her.

PRINCESS DIES IN LEAP FROM EIFFEL TOWER

Anna Troubetzkoy, Young Bride, Amazes Paris by Mad Deed—Farewell Letters Found in Purse

PARIS, July 17.—(AP)—Paris was amazed today to learn that Princess Anna Obolensky Troubetzkoy, a young bride, had ended her life by jumping from the ramparts of the Eiffel tower while the city was celebrating Bastille day Tuesday.

It was assumed that she was an ordinary Russian emigre till advice from New York told of her recent marriage there and her intention to row her husband by a Russian orthodox ceremony in France.

Police said a purse found after the plunge contained farewell letters signed "Anna Obolensky" and revealed she lived with her sister, Mme. Chreptovitch, in Clamart, a suburb of Paris.

Petit Parisien, in commenting on her death, said: "None of the numerous visitors on the third platform thought the elegant young woman wished to die. They could not prevent her from getting over the parapet when she threw herself into space. After striking the ironwork her body crashed to earth."

DEATH DRIVER FOUND GUILTY, OREGON CITY

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 17.—(AP) Howard Magnuson, 25, of Woodburn, driver of the truck which last June 5 crashed into a passenger car killing four persons and fatally injuring a fifth, was convicted by a circuit court jury here late yesterday.

Sentence will be passed next Tuesday. The penalty provided is from one to 15 years in prison, with a fine ranging up to \$5000.

TORCH MURDERER CALM ON GIBBET

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, July 17.—(AP) Charles Simpson, 18, was hanged here today for the torch murder of Mrs. Albina Voorhies, elderly San Francisco grocery storekeeper. The trap was sprung at 10:03 a. m. Simpson was pronounced dead about twelve minutes later.

The youth went to his death calmly. He marched swiftly up the thirteen steps to the gallows, and took one look at the gibbet before the black hood was adjusted. The hangman experienced some trouble adjusting the new death cap. Simpson did not utter a word before his execution.

Slump Cuts Drunk Fines.

FORD'S SON PAYS FOR ROAD MOVING

MT. CLEMENS, Mich.—(UP)—"Move the road, I'll pay for it," said Edsel B. Ford, president of the Ford Motor company, in petitioning the Macomb county road commission for relocation of a public highway skirting his expansive estate near here.

In accordance with Ford's wish, the commission has let bids to relocate approximately three-quarters of a mile of Jefferson avenue, where it borders the automobile manufacturer's estate.

The project will cost Ford \$64,144, but it will greatly enhance the beauty of his estate and keep it from the prying eyes of motorists.
