CONGRESSMEN PLEDGE CRATER PARK SUPPORT

Delegation Impressed by Scenic Attraction On Visit to Park—Attend Dedication of Sinnot Memorial

Well impressed with Crater lake and cognizant of its needs for future development, the sub-committee of the house appropriations committee for the department of the interior left Crater Lake National park last evening for Seattle on its northward trip to Fairbanks, Alaska. Chairman Frank Murphy, Ohio, indicated that everything in the power of the committee will be done to encourage further development of the scenic attraction. Although the depression continues, it is likely as good provision as circumstances allow will be made for the lake area, Mr. Murphy said. The committee spent a portion of yesterday forenoon viewing lake projects and plans for the future, all of which were approved by the committee, which even lent a few suggestions on improvement points, which had not been demanded by the park. Superintendent E. C. Solinsky accompanied the committee on its park tour and explained all provisions. Laud Solinsky. The committee is not only anxious to aid the park because of its wonderful scenic attraction, but also because of the good management which it is now under, Chairman Murphy said in Klamath Falls last evening. The park is well kept and has an organization functioning like clockwork, he pointed out. Like other members of the committee, Chairman Murphy was deeply impressed by the beauty of the lake area, and declared southern Oregon has a spot the world can envy. He was a member of the rim drive party Wednesday afternoon, presenting views from various sides of the 26-mile crater. Stops were made and lectures presented for the benefit of the distinguished visitors. A special program was presented in the Crater Lake Lodge Wednesday evening, including winter scene pictures by John Maben and singing by members of the lodge staff. Park Naturalist D. S. Libbey reviewed the geological history of the lake and described the rise and fall of Mt. Mazama, which surmounted it in ages gone by.

Enjoy Lake Diversions. Yesterday forenoon, committee members were given boat rides on the lake, some enjoyed fishing and others horse back riding. They left Klamath Falls last evening for Seattle to board a boat for Alaska in continuation of the itinerary to end August 14.

By that time the party will have visited 14 reclamation projects and several national parks. Reclamation projects in Oregon include the Owyhee in eastern Oregon and the Vale district in the same section. The Owyhee represents an ultimate outlay of 17 million dollars, of which the government has already spent eight million. The Vale district is considerably smaller, but is also important.

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
