CRATER TRIP HEADED BY PARK NATURALIST

CRATER LAKE, July 18.—(Sp.)—A new caravan field trip for the Crater Lake National Park, around the crater rim for 35 miles, was inaugurated this week by the educational division, headed by D. S. Libbey, park naturalist. The trip, one of the most distinctive in the national park system, approximates three hours in length.

The Snodgrass memorial, observation station and museum on Victor road, a short distance west of the lodge, is the starting point of the rim caravan. At the memorial, the features of the lake are pointed out to members of the party, accompanied by a short lecture. Geological points of the inner rim are explained and opportunity given to ask questions.

ANCIENT GOLD PAN BELIEVED LEFT BY LAKE DISCOVERER

A relic of a bygone day when prospectors occasionally found their way to the Crater Lake area and believed to have direct connection with John W. Hillman, who discovered Crater Lake in 1852, an old gold mining pan was recently found in the general location of Hillman's old camp site, not far from the "Watchman," first high point on the rim of the lake west of the lodge.

The pan, victim of the elements, rusted, bent and mostly a battered piece of tin, was found by Fred Patton, a Park foreman, while engaged in road work. A water bucket, bent double, a broken crock, and two bottles were also found.

Two pine trees cut down so long ago that the trunks had decomposed almost level with the ground are the only signs of camp. Time had left its mark and indication that the camp may have rounded to the voices of Hillman's party in '52. It was in the general direction of the route that his party had taken from Jacksonville in the search of the famed Lost Cabin mine, trailing a party of Californians who thought they had information the mine was located along the headwaters of the Rogue river.

The pan is a realistic reminder of the visit of the party of Californians to Jacksonville in 1852 and how they camped outside the then booming mining town, keeping secret their mission. However a member of the party becoming inebriated on liquor, betrayed his trust.

When the Californians left Jacksonville, a party of Oregonians took up their trail, led by Hillman. For days the southern party attempted to elude the pursuers but unavailingly until both parties realized the necessity of meat. The two parties joined, with the exception of a few who turned back to Jacksonville, 80 miles away, and combined game hunting with the search for the mine.

There is a supposition that Hillman may have left the camp site where the pan and water bucket were found on the day he discovered the lake, June 12, riding up the slope of the rim, unknowing that on the other side he was about to discover a scenic wonder of the world, a deep blue lake in the crater of an extinct volcano.

The mining pan and bucket will be placed in the park museum.

RARE FERN IS FOUND IN CRATER NATIONAL

CRATER LAKE.—(Special)—As a part of a tour that has taken them to most of the national parks and many points in the nation, Prof. Edgar T. Wherry, University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, Pa., and Dr. Francis W. Pennell, Academy of Natural Sciences, Philadelphia, both nationally known botanists, spent two days this week in the Crater Lake National Park, en route to Mt. Rainier in Washington.

The two men made a general study of flowers in the Crater Lake area and were especially interested in the presence of a rare fern in the park, growing on the summit of Liso rock, along the rim of the lake. The fern is of recent discovery and has been found only twice by collectors in the history of botany.

HOLT WILL HEAD NEW AGRICULTURE ADVISORY BOARD

SALISBURY, July 18.—(AP)—J. O. Holt of Eugene was elected president of the state agricultural advisory board at the initial meeting of the new organization held here late yesterday. Max Gebhard, director of agriculture, was elected secretary, as provided by the new statutes.

The board was provided by law to act in an advisory capacity to the new state department of agriculture and individual members voiced their approval of the organization progress made since the inauguration July 1.

The board passed resolutions protesting importation of cattle into Oregon from other states resulting in decline of local markets; provisions for sterilization of poultry crates, and that steps be taken to combat the infectious bronchitis now existing in some poultry flocks.

The members of the board are Director Gebhard, J. O. Holt, representing horticulture; Fred Cockell, Milwaukie, poultry; H. R. Richards, The Dalles, farm crops; Morton Tompkins, Dayton, gardening; Martin Rostvold, Woodburn, cooperative marketing; Robert Bond, Pendleton, livestock and animal industry; and C. C. Dixon, Sheed, dairying.
