## PRE-HISTORIC LOG BELIEVED CLUE TO LAKE'S FORMATION

### CRATER LAKE—(Special)

Reaching back to the dim past of yester-years when Mt. Mazama was a seething volcano, reddening the heavens at night and sending forth great clouds of smoke in the day, the recent discovery of carbonized wood in the Union creek section is directly linked with the volcanic activity of the disappeared mountain, now the resting place of Crater Lake.

The wood, buried under a burden of volcanic tuff as deep as 60 feet, is 23 miles west of the lake rim. A number of the logs are over 20 feet in length and were found resting in horizontal position, sans roots, stumps or branches. However, small branches were found detached, indicating that with the logs, they had floated there in water and were subsequently buried by the volcanic ash.

The discovery was made by road crews grading on the Union creek road to Diamond lake along near the Rogue river.

The wood is completely turned to charcoal, the logs having been entombed under thick loads of hot ashes and the heat, coupled with the rapidly in which they fell, resulted in the exclusion of oxygen, preventing the combustion of the material.

D. S. Libbey, naturalist of the Crater Lake National Park, visited the scene a few days ago and plans to preserve a complete assortment of the wood. If subsequent finds of such wood are made, it is thought scientific investigators can piece together a coherent story of the origin of Crater Lake.
