GRAND JURY CALL IS POSTPONED TO COMING OCTOBER
The county court today, without taking definite action, considered the new state tax plan, adopted by the governor's tax committee last Saturday, which is modeled upon the "Indiana plan." Provisions regarding financing and maintenance of secondary roads, were discussed by the county court. They also favor a change in the jury system whereby litigants in civil suits would be required to pay the jury cost, instead of the county. In many of the minor lawsuits, the cost to the county is more than the amount sought in the suit. The county court feels that economy could be accomplished by requiring the contending parties to file bonds for the costs. Jackson county is now well within its budget for the year, and steps to remain there are being taken. One was the suspension of all road work in mid-summer, including work on the Lake Creek and Dead Indian, beneficial chiefly from an employment standpoint to the districts themselves.

With the 15 per cent increase in railroad freight rates undoubtedly coming, freight to Liverpool, where world prices are made, would amount to more than the farmer gets for his wheat.

CRESCENT HARBOR TO HAVE RAILROAD KIWANIS ASSURED

A railroad will undoubtedly be built to the Crescent City harbor before the harbor is completed. A. H. Banwell, secretary of the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association, told members of the Kiwanis club at the regular luncheon at the Hotel Medford today.

Justification for this statement, he said, is found in all investigations of the situation recently made.

The work of the association, which is at the present time concentrating on development of the harbor, was reviewed by Mr. Banwell, who emphasized the need for agricultural and industrial development in the Mid-Pacific Empire, which will undoubtedly come with construction of the harbor.

Support of the Pacific development in congress has won the support of various other sections. Mr. Banwell informed the club, and the harbor project seems assured. The tremendous amount of commerce to pass through the harbor was emphasized and the co-operation of the Kiwanis club in keeping the harbor question before the people asked by the speaker.

The work of the development association is not a fight with the railroads, Mr. Banwell pointed out. It is the association's belief that the harbor will prove an asset, rather than a liability to the existing railway system. Commerce passing through the harbor now, however, has already been instrumental in effecting lower freight rates, he said, and the development will mean much to the utilization of the natural resources found in the rich mid-Pacific domain.

Mr. Banwell's talk was greeted with much enthusiasm by the club members, who join him in believing "the harbor will be built."

Frank Dillard, former city water engineer, who is now participating in several engineering projects on the coast, was a guest at today's luncheon and told his fellow Kiwanians that "people living in Medford don't know what hard times are."

Many men on the coast are now willing to work for one dollar a day, he said, in reviewing numerous sad cases where jobs cannot be obtained at any price. He quoted a southern banker in saying that the coming winter will be the hardest the south has ever known.
