FOREST FIRE IS SOON QUENCHED

Following the quenching of a small forest fire, which burned over an area of two acres of brush one-half mile south of Jacksonville this forenoon from the time it was discovered at 9 a. m., until it was put under control at 10:30 a. m., this noon another small fire, also on state protected land near the Dodge bridge was reported at the district state fire warden's headquarters here about the condition of which no news had been received up to the hour of going to press.

The fire south of Jacksonville is said to have been started by careless smokers, and a peculiar fact in connection with it, is that shortly after Dwight Phillips, district state fire warden arrived with his crew of men and began work on controlling it, Chief ranger Bill Jones of Crater National forest, who has been in charge of the active fighting at the Big Applegate fire, and a truck load of his men, while passing near noticed the smoke of this fire, and headed for it, arriving in time to be of much assistance to the hippo crew.

WEARY PIGEON IS FOUND, BT. FALLS

Seeking a friendly resting place and relief for his aching foot, a homing pigeon came to earth yesterday at Owen Oregon lumber camp No. 2 near Butte Falls after flying from Humpstulls, Wn., where he took wing July 18.

He limped across the wet brown earth, breathed the pine-scented air, unfolded his blue-gray wings and turned to George Carper, camp employe, for help.

Mr. Carper, who has a brood of pigeons of his own, picked up the bird and found tied, 100 tightly, to his right leg this message: "Pigeon was captured N. T. Louisa farm, Humpstulls, Wn. June 25, held until July 18, advertised in paper, no answer."

On his other leg a band carried the following inscription: "Au 29, V. H. S. 110."

The leg to which the first message had been tied was swollen and sore, making flying difficult for the pigeon. He seemed to sense the presence of a dove cote and understanding person, when he landed at the camp and limped across to the Carper cabin. The rubber band was removed from the leg but the bird still limps. Mr. Carper will hold him until someone claims him and if no one does, he will add him to his already large pigeon family.

The bird is bluish-gray in color and has an almost purple breast with flecks of white around his eyes and beak.

INTANGIBLES EXEMPT IN WASHINGTON TAX

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 24—(AP)—The Washington state supreme court unanimously upheld an act passed by the 1931 legislature exempting monies and intangibles from taxation.

The voters of the state approved a constitutional amendment in 1930 permitting the legislature to classify property for the purpose of taxation. The legislature then passed the act exempting monies and intangibles.
