

FIRE FIGHTERS BACK IN TOWN SPEND CHECKS

Hard-Earned Dollars Soon In Circulation—Jacksonville Volunteer Band Is Praised For Efforts.

The big forest fire in the Applegate section, which has been burning since Sunday, although under control and still burning inside the fire lines, was a such a satisfactory condition today that Crater national forest officials discharged about 80 more men, leaving only one camp of about 60 men working on the fire to prevent possible spread.

The forest officials wish to publicly express their gratitude to the 19 citizens of Jacksonville who, when the Forest creek fire was discovered early in the week, proceeded to the scene at once and began work voluntarily, keeping at it until a large crew of forestry fire fighters arrived on the scene.

Saved Much Timber

If it had not been for prompt and splendid work performed by this volunteer band of citizenry the Forest creek fire, which covered 40 to 50 acres before controlled, would probably have developed into as big a forest conflagration as the Wellington Butte-Humburg Creek fire that has caused so much trouble all week.

The 80 discharged fire fighters began rolling into this city early this forenoon in the trucks of the Crater national forest service, the largest trucks being able to transport 35 men each standing up, on a trip.

As fast as unloaded in front of the federal building the erstwhile fire fighters hurried with their pay requisitions to the forestry headquarters office, where Miss Janie Smith, chief clerk, made out their pay checks.

Money Circulates

Through the big forest fire and the ones at Forest creek the Crater national forest has put many dollars into circulation here this week, as each fire fighter is paid 30 cents an hour and is furnished subsistence while working. It costs much to feed these 250 men, provide them with water and furnish coaks and flunkies for each of the three camps established, to say nothing of the cost of operating the trucks and tanks used in the fire fighting and transporting of supplies.

Although the fire fighters are provided with no comforts or frills, they are well fed, the meals being surprisingly good, with meats, fruits and vegetables in plenty.

Four meals a day were served at the camps, only two of which, the morning meal at 3:30 a. m. and the last meal at night, were served in camp. The other two meals were carried to the fire lines to the men, so that little time would be lost in fire fighting.

Only blankets were furnished for sleeping, the tired men lying down on the ground at night—so tired and exhausted that they slept soundly on anything, no matter how rough.

Water a Problem

The greatest trouble was in supplying drinking water and getting it up to the firelines. Fire fighting is an immensely thirsty business, and to make the thirst of 250 men all wells in the immediate fire district were pretty well depleted this week. It was poor territory for water, there being but a few rocky springs, and water had to be hauled from distances at times.

One of the greatest treats in the drinking line was when Hugh Rankin, supervisor of Crater national forest, the other night hauled two ten-gallon barrels of Medford water out to the camps. This supply quickly disappeared.

ABE'S MESSENGER DIES IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., July 24.—(AP)—A man who as a boy carried messages for President Abraham Lincoln, many of them from Mrs. Lincoln requesting the president to "hurry to dinner," was dead here today.

Requiem mass will be held for Edward Grandtze, 85, in St. Joseph's Catholic church tomorrow. He came to the United States from Paris when he was 11 years old. His aunt managed the legation mess in Washington, D. C., and prior to the civil war—from 1858 to 1860—the boy was messenger for the French legation.

He carried many messages for the president, who later asked him to become his personal messenger.

CHILE STUDENTS DARE TROOPS TO TAKE BARRICADE

SANTIAGO, Chile, July 24.—(AP)—Anti-government students, who remained barricaded in the University of Chile last night in defiance of an ultimatum and dared troops to fire on them, stuck to their posts today while the authorities attempted to deal with them peacefully.
Meanwhile from 300 to 500 persons nursed cracked heads and other injuries received during a turbulent night in the course of which a fire arms store was looted, several street cars wrecked and the principal streets were the scenes of almost continuous clashes between demonstrators and police.
A few hours after he had become premier of Chile yesterday, Carlos Prosser took over the task of restoring order, and he quickly served notice on the barricaded students that unless they vacated their stronghold they would be fired on.
The students refused to budge, and word got about that they had decided to set fire to the building and, if need be, die in it rather than surrender.

SPANISH SOLDIERS IN MOOD TO SLAY REDS

SEVILLE, Spain, July 24.—(AP)—Civil guards, troops and police, stirred by the death of a civil guard captain in strike disorders, patrolled the streets of Seville today with their rifles at half-cock while artillery units menaced another communist syndical center as a precaution against disorders.
Authorities expressed belief the worst of the "revolutionary strike," they call it, was passed.

PHEASANT PLUNGES THROUGH WINDSHIELD

"Through diligence and application this man learned a trade. Then a law takes it away from him and throws him out of a job. I commend him for his restraint in not pursuing his trade, regardless of the law. With these remarks the judge dismissed the charges."
