next week.

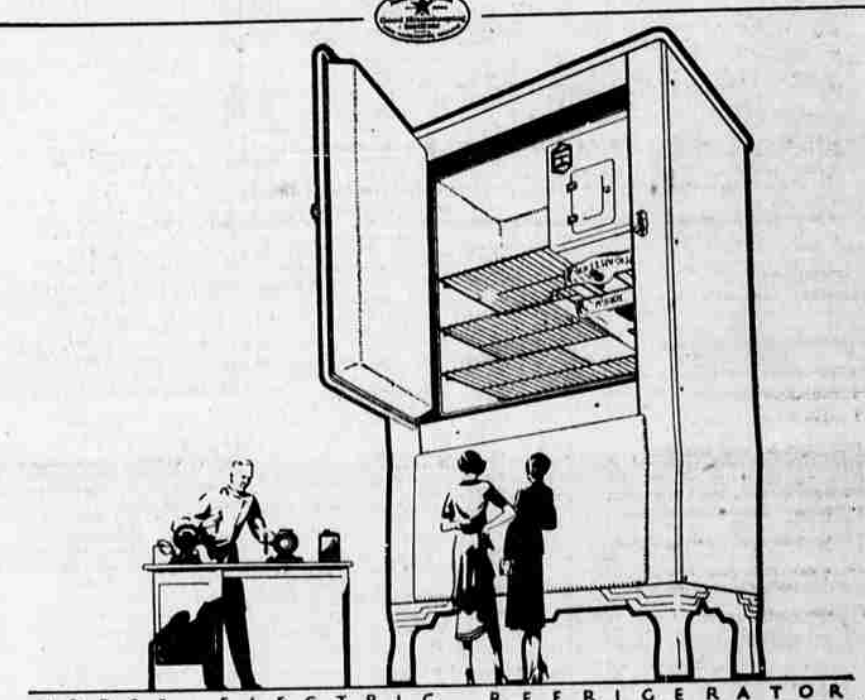
Mr. and Mrs. Mann Sail Tuesday From Seattle for Alaska
