CHEERING GERMANS FOLLOW McDONALD

Berlin, July 27.—(AP)—Thousands of cheering Germans welcomed Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald when he arrived here this afternoon to resume his conversations with German statesmen. They hail him the most vociferous welcome a visiting foreigner had received in years.

He reached the capital several hours after Arthur Henderson, the British foreign secretary, arrived to step into a cheering crowd which gave unmistakable evidence of the friendship of the German people.

ILEANA SAYS 'YES' WITH LOUD VOICE IN ROYAL WEDDING

SINAIA, Rumania, July 27.—(AP)—Prince Anton and Princess Ileana were on their wedding journey today, and the peasants who thronged Sinaia yesterday were on their way back home, traveling bareback and by ox-cart.

After the brilliant pageantry of the wedding, the bride and groom left for Castle Bran in Transylvania, where they will spend several days. Then they go to London for awhile, and from there they fly in their wedding gifts airplane from King Carol—to their castle at Freiburg, Germany. The prince is an expert aviator.

Ileana, daughter of the late King Ferdinand and Marie, now queen, and Anton, seventh son of Archduke Leopold Salvator of Hapsburg, were married in the Palace of Peleah, a romantic looking castle among the pine trees in Sinaia's hills.

The religious ceremony, by the Roman Catholic rite, took place in the large hall of the palace before about 300 guests. Ileana said her "yes" in a loud, firm voice; Anton's was scarcely audible.

SECOND JARDINE IN DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

WASHINGTON, (AP)—There is to be another Jardine in the United States department of agriculture.

He is James T. Jardine, a brother of William M. Jardine, secretary of agriculture under President Coolidge and now minister to Egypt.

The newcomer will take office September 1 as head of experiment stations in the department, and assistant director of scientific work.

Jardine's duties will be to correlate research at state and insular experiment stations, of which there are 53 carrying on about 9,500 projects. An assistant director of scientific research work he will help correlate the research projects in the department itself.

He is 56 years old; was born at Cherry Creek, Idaho, and was graduated from the Utah Agricultural college. After teaching English in that college for several years, he entered the forest service to become successively special agent, forest supervisor and inspector of grazing.

He has been director of the Oregon Agricultural experiment station since 1920. During that time he studied the agricultural situation in Alaska for the government and also undertook a survey of land grant colleges and universities.

SILK CROP FAILS IN CHINA AREAS

NANKING.—(UP)—The Ministry of Industries reports that the silk crop in several provinces has been a total failure and a shortage in raw silk may be expected.

Unseasonably cold and damp weather killed not only the first, but the second crop of worms.

The economic bulletin. It was necessary to feed young worms on wood mulberry leaves, which killed most of them and those which spun cocoons produced an inferior grade.

From the districts which fared best, says the bulletin, come reports of a crop less than 40 per cent of normal, and in many districts there has been no crop at all.

Farmers in these districts depend to a large extent upon the silk-worm crop. Women and children assist in care of the worms. Often the cocoons are the only means of livelihood for hundreds of families.

The poor quality of cocoons produced, due to the unseasonable weather, will probably result in additional losses to silk mills in Shanghai and elsewhere, says the bulletin.

TREE KEEPS ALIVE HUBBARD MEMORY

EAST AURORA, N. Y.—(UP)—An apple tree is keeping alive the memory of Elbert Hubbard, philosopher and lover of man, lost in the Lusitania disaster.

Charles J. Rosen, official of the Roycroft shops, and Elbert Hubbard 3rd dedicated the tree at simple ceremonies here recently.

"Elbert Hubbard symbolized life," Rosen said, "and that is why we chose a tree instead of a building to dedicate to his memory."

"We thank God, who made this tree, for Elbert Hubbard."

SACK OF BONES MAY HOLD CLUE BASSETT DEATH

EVERETT, Wash., July 27.—(AP)—Recovery from the waters of Puget Sound of a burlap sack containing most of the bones of a human skeleton at Edmonds, south of here, yesterday by a fisherman spurred officers to renew their efforts to solve the mysterious disappearance of James Eugene Bassett, former Maryland naval officer who dropped from sight track in September 1928.

The sack, sewed across the top with galvanized wire, contained practically all the bones of a skeleton except the skull and collarbones.

Arrangements were being made to have a diver search the bottom of the bay where the sack was found in an attempt to recover the missing portions of the skeleton.

The bones, officials said, had apparently been removed from a burial place and treated with acid or quicklime, supposedly in an unsuccessful effort to destroy them. Dr. H. M. Kretzler, Edmonds physician, pronounced the remains as those of a man. A number of articles, including a moss agate and a brass knob such as may have been used on a jewelry case, were found in the sack.

BRITISH RULERS GET NEW FLEET OF CARS

LONDON (UP)—King George and Queen Mary have six new automobiles. The new fleet of cars includes two limousines and a brougham for the king and a limousine and a brougham for the queen.

Four of the automobiles are painted in the royal colors of scarlet and maroon. The queen's private car is painted in the traditional green. The limousines are fitted with armchair seats and the broughams with folding occasional seats.

All the cars are fitted with fluid flywheels and self-changing gear-boxes.
