LINDBERGS TO BID FAREWELL AND HOP WEST

Colonel and Wife Leave Washington for North Haven, Maine—Baby to Stay With Grandparents

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh left today for North Haven, Maine, for family farewells before continuing their aerial vacation trip to Japan. The Lindberghs took off to the southward after taxiing about the river to warm up their motor. Circling about, the colonel headed back up the Potomac and as he passed over the Annapolis naval station, dipped his wings in farewell and dropped a missile from his plane. A boat went out to pick it up, thinking it might be a note. The departure was made at 1:20 p. m. after several hours had been spent in fueling and testing the radio with which the ship is equipped. May Fly All Day. Lindbergh expected to fly directly over land, despite his postwar equipment. If his radio is working well he planned to make North Haven today. If necessary, however, they will spend the night at North Beach, New York.

RIGHTS ON ROGUE ARGUED THURSDAY

The case of the California property owners along Rogue river who have brought suit against a group of placer miners will be heard Thursday of this week in the court of Circuit Judge H. H. Norton. Suit is filed by the Anglo-London-Paris National bank of San Francisco against Tyson Panky and others. The bank represents Herbert Fleischacker and others owning property and homes on the river. The plaintiffs allege that the placer operations are damaging the shore line and property. A temporary restraining order is now in effect halting placer mining in the region. A large group of the miners have been operating along the river during the period of depression and unemployment, it is said.
