## IMPROVING PHONE SERVICE TO LAKE

EAGLE POINT, Ore., July 28. (Sp.)—Direct telephone service to Crater Lake lodge will soon be instituted, according to Robert La Roque, manager of Columbia Utilities, owners of the Eagle Point telephone system.

Construction of nine miles of new line is now in progress between Rogue Elk resort and Prospect. Copper wire is now being strung and this will complete the direct line between Eagle Point and Crater Lake lodge. Four extra men are employed on the work which will be completed in about 10 days.

## NURSE'S CHARGES AIRED TOMORROW AT COURT HOUSE

Hearing of the case filed by Mrs. Lyda T. King, ousted Jackson county public health nurse, against Dr. B. C. Wilson, county physician, will be heard tomorrow afternoon at the county court house. Mrs. King charges Dr. Wilson with misappropriation of department funds, incompetency and taking alcohol for his private use.

Mrs. King yesterday handed in a formal resignation to the county court on the grounds that Dr. Wil-

son was without authority to discharge her. The communication states that she wishes the resignation to become effective August 1. "But if the court insists on the customary two weeks' notice," the letter continues, "August 15 will be satisfactory."

It was announced at the county court house today that Mrs. King is not working as county nurse now and has not been since she was discharged by Dr. Wilson.

An important part of Wednesday's hearing will be as to whether or not the county physician was acting within his authority in discharging Mrs. King.
