## LOCAL OFFICIALS WITHHOLD ACTION ON DEV WILLIAMS

Definite action will not be taken in the case of D. Williams, who was arrested in Philadelphia last week, and for whom a warrant had been issued in Jackson county, until word is received from the eastern city as to what charges are against him there, according to information from the district attorney's office today.

Seattle authorities were also searching for the stock promoter, and their decisions as to action in the case is also being awaited. The district attorney said today that the expense of bringing Williams back to Medford would be great, and if he is being prosecuted in the east, it is doubtful if he will be brought here.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—(AP)—Information was received here today that Steele D. Williams, 54, whose finger prints indicate he is Dev Williams, wanted at Medford, has been arrested by Philadelphia police.

Detectives here declare Williams is wanted at Medford for questioning in connection with a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. He is accused of selling 1000 shares of stock in a reputedly non-existent mining company, to several Medford residents.

He also is alleged to have advertised in Portland newspapers, saying he wanted to hire responsible engineers. Several men called in answer to the advertisements and Williams was said to have attempted to interest them in buying shares in the company.
