

# SALEM JUNIORS DEFEAT EUGENE SCORE 23 TO 0

### Team Which Shoved Medford From Championship Race, Demonstrates Superiority in Legion Play

SALEM, July 30.—(AP)—Any doubt as to Marion county's right over Eugene to represent the district in the American Legion junior baseball contest, was quelled last night when the district champions defeated Eugene by a score of 23 to 0. It was not an official game figuring in the state championship results.

The game was featured more by the visitors' lack of effective pitching and fielding than by the local juniors' hitting ability. Marion county scored the 23 runs on only 15 hits. Eugene runners reached third base three times, but died at that point. A return game is scheduled to be played in Eugene Saturday.

Defeat of the Eugene team by the western Oregon junior baseball champs of Salem is of interest to local followers of the state games. The two-game series between Salem and Eugene was arranged following the disqualification of the Eugene team. The Eugene nine defeated the Medford boys 16 to 12 at Eugene. Later it was held some of the Eugene players were not eligible.

The Medford nine was then reinstated and given the right to play the State team in the state semi-finals here last Sunday. Results were disastrous for the locals as Salem outplayed them to win, 15 to 7.

Local fans are backing the Salem team to win the state junior championship from Portland August 6, 7 and 8, when the final series are played at the Corvallis convention of the American Legion.

## SECRETARY HYDE ENJOYS ANGLING IN CRATER LAKE

CRATER LAKE.—(Special).—A successful fishing trip featured the visit this week of Arthur U. Hyde, United States secretary of agriculture, to the Crater Lake national park, while on a vacation tour of the west. Secretary Hyde caught several speckled beauties and was accompanied on the trip by H. R. Hoffman, assistant secretary, Park Superintendent E. G. Bolinsky and R. W. Price, vice-president and manager of the Crater Lake National Park company.

Secretary Hyde is an angler of long experience and declared Crater Lake fishing is equal to the best he had ever enjoyed. He has plans of returning to the lake on another vacation.

Taking a rest from the duties of his office, Secretary Hyde had no comment to make on national affairs, but indicated the seriousness of the wheat surplus situation as one of the big problems of his office.

His first visit to the park, Crater Lake was a source of great wonderment to the secretary, eager to learn the entire geological history of the lake area. A walk down the crater wall trail from the rim to the water was another revelation of scenic beauty, as well as a horseback ride up the trail in full moonlight at the end of the fishing trip.

Secretary Hyde was accompanied to the park by Mrs. Hyde and daughter Caroline, Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Hoffman, Stuart, United States chief forester; Dr. L. J. Hennes, San Francisco, deputy chief of the federal bureau of public roads; C. J. Buck, Portland, regional forester, and other federal officials.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30.—(AP)—Jack Ganson, heavyweight wrestler, returned to Portland after several years' absence, to defeat Axel Anderson, Swedish giant, two out of three falls here last night. Ganson, who falls from Brooklyn, N. Y., won the first fall in 10 minutes 35 seconds, with repeated Sonnenberg rams. Anderson took the second fall in 10 minutes, 25 seconds, when he picked Ganson up by the ankles, stood him on his head and pressed his shoulders to the mat. Anderson attempted to repeat this operation, but Ganson got one foot free, planted it under Anderson's chin, sending the latter over backwards. Ganson pounced on him for the deciding fall; time 12 minutes, 15 seconds.

### 'I'm Not Going to Monkey With Him Any More,' Says Seattle President After Second Defeat

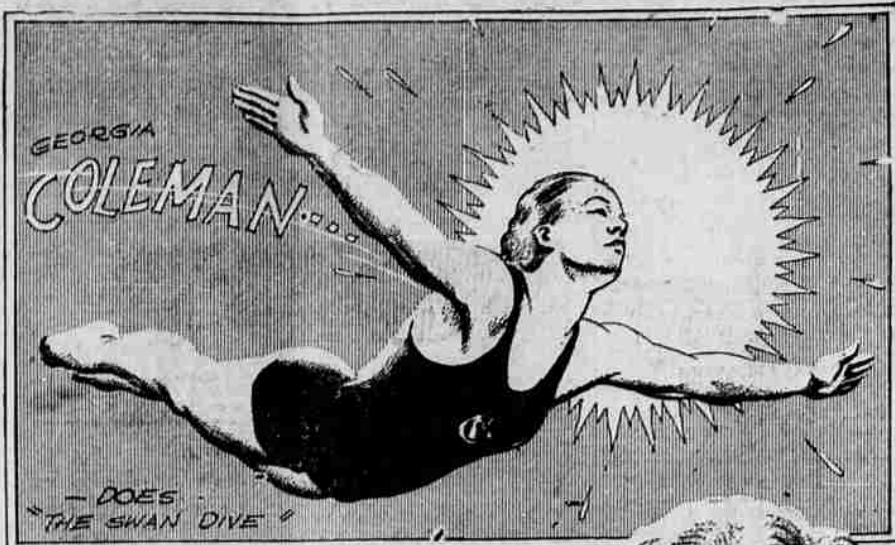

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## Strength and Endurance Best at 160-170 Pounds And Between 30-50 Years

WASHINGTON, July 30.—(AP)—The old idea of a good big man can always beat a good little one apparently is partly wrong. Extensive tests by the public health service point in that direction anyway, with nearly 500 men, between 20 and 34 years old as subjects. Tentatively, the ideal weight for

strength and endurance was found to be between 160 and 170 pounds. Below 170, an increase in push pull, lifting strength, grip and lung force was recorded for each 10-pound advance. Over 170, the tests showed erratic results, with increases in one phase offset by losses in others. As an example, pulling strength in the 180 to 170 pounders averaged 96.9 pounds, but dropped to 91 in the 150-189 group, while lifting capacity rose between 180 and 190. The greatest strength in all capacities was found in men between 67 and 68 inches tall. Strength was shown to increase up to 30 years of age.

## GIANTS AND CUBS RENEW OLD FEUD BEHIND REDBIRDS

The rivalry between the New York Giants and Chicago Cubs, which is just about as old as the two teams, has raised its head once more in the 1931 national league race. But this year the teams are not battling each other for the pennant and there seems to be little chance that either will overtake the flying St. Louis Cardinals.

In the past few weeks, the Giants and Cubs have changed positions every few days, first one slipping a trifle ahead and then the other catching up. The Giants are on top today, holding second place by the margin of half a game by virtue of their 5-4 triumph over Pittsburgh yesterday and Chicago's 4-0 shut-out at the hands of the Phillies.

Grantham Errors Aid. It took a real struggle to put the Giants into second. Despite three runs in the first inning, the gift of George Grantham, whose errors paved the way for the rally, New York barely lasted as Grantham and Ed Phillips picked Bill Walker for home runs. The Cubs could make no headway at all against Ray Benge's hurling and got only five scattered hits.

The Cardinals also ran into a five hit shut-out with Ed Brandt doing the hurling to give the Boston Braves a 3 to 0 victory. It did not, however, seriously damage the Cards' pennant hopes for they held an eight game lead over the Giants.

The Brooklyn Robins, slipping slowly out of the race, ran into another setback at the hands of the Cincinnati Reds. They lost a 2 to 1 decision as Silas Johnson, Cincinnati ace, outpitched Babe Phelps.

Fine pitching by Roy Mahaffey and Jimmy Fox's 20th home run combined to give the Philadelphia Athletics a 4 to 2 victory over the St. Louis Browns and to increase their margin in the American league pennant chase to 12 games.

Ferrell Blanks Solons. Washington, closest rival of the world champions, found Wes Ferrell, ace of the Cleveland mound staff, a bit too much and took a 6 to 0 beating. Ferrell gave 10 hits but kept them scattered while Joe Vosmik sent him off ahead with a homer with two on base in the first inning.

Babe Ruth lined his 28th homer of the season into the right field bleachers at the Yankee Stadium as the feature of New York's 10 to 4 vic-

tory over the Chicago Lary and Lazzari also hit the Yankees and Kerr's circuit one of seven hits off George. The Boston Red Sox Tigers divided their clubhouse.
