BUTTER MARKET SHOWING UNREST EGGS STRONGER

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3.—(P)—Market for butter continues to reflect considerable strength with premiums above the exchange price held for cubes. However, there is an undercurrent of unrest as a result of pouring so much milk into butter channels.

Egg market shows considerable strength locally with cooperative list prices generally maintained by 173 organization as well as private firms for quality stuff. Some hot weather eggs are offering for 12c.

No further price changes are reported by the Tillamook cheese association.

There was no change whatever in the general market for live chickens during the day.

Further general price recession is again noted in the market for tomatoes as a result of further liberal gain in the supply.

Market for poultry head lettuce is firmly held at full prices with continued shortage of offerings of class.

Market for peaches is very quiet. Corn continues to sell at an extremely low price with much more offering than demand calls for. Sales are generally under 50-60c sack for good quality.

Hot weather has forced a further fractional rise in watermelons. Country killed veal are steady with a fair tone for hogs and lambs.

Cucumbers are very slow; generally 25c box. Pear market is slow for Bartlett at \$2-2.25 box. Potatoes and onions are unchanged.
