## MISFIT PLAYERS PROVE VALUABLE ON RIGHT TEAM

### Brooklyn Castoffs, Hendrick and Flowers, Going Well With New Playfellows—Pittsburg Pirates Crack

Two Brooklyn castoffs, Harvey Hendrick and Jake Flowers, who were merely good but not particularly useful utility players with the Red Sox, Cleveland Indians and Boston Braves before he landed with the New York Giants in midseason, Hendrick has fitted nicely into the Giant machine in the hole left by the injury of Hughie Crite. He has proved an expert defensive player and, while not a strong batter, a good enough man at the plate. He is a former Portland Coast league player.

Hunnifield Doing Well Another such player has cropped up recently is Bill Hunnifield, who had a varied career with the Chicago White Sox, Cleveland Indians and Boston Braves before he landed with the New York Giants in midseason. Hunnifield has fitted nicely into the Giant machine in the hole left by the injury of Hughie Crite. He has proved an expert defensive player and, while not a strong batter, a good enough man at the plate. He is a former Portland Coast league player.

Hunnifield did his share toward New York's double victory over the Brooklyn Robins yesterday by driving in one run in the first game and scoring one in the second. Travis Jackson was the big gun of the Giant attack that turned back the Robins by scores of 6 to 3 and 3 to 2. Cubs Humble Reds Chicago's Cubs, refusing to let the Giants gain an inch in their struggle for second place, took a doubleheader from the Humble Cincinnati Reds by scores of 4 to 2 and 7 to 3.

Pittsburgh ran its string of shut-out innings to 45, then saw it broken with a loud crash. Henry Meine, trying for his third straight shutout victory over the Cardinals, made an error in the sixth inning and the league champions broke through for seven runs in two innings to win 7 to 1.

The Phillies and the Boston Braves split the third twin bill on the National league program. Ray Benge stopped the Braves with six hits to gain a 3 to 2 victory in the opener while W. Willie Sherdel outpitched Chas Dudley in the second clash and Boston won 4 to 2.

Vic Frazier's pitching enabled the Chicago White Sox to gain an even break with Detroit in their "cellar" series. Frazier, who won the opening game Saturday with a six-hit performance, held the Tigers to eight blows to win the final clash 5 to 1.

## CRACK JUVENILES HOLD UP WELL AS THREE-YEAR-OLDS

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Equipoise, Twenty Grand, Vander Pool, Jamestown and Don Leon.

These were the stars that shone brightest in the thoroughbred firmament at the beginning of the 1931 season, but how have these crack juveniles of yesterday fared in the racing campaigns to date? Equipoise, leading money winner as a two-year old, is out of racing, until the autumn at least, because of an injury that forced his last-minute withdrawal from the Kentucky derby.

Twenty Grand and Mate are battling it out over various tracks for the three-year old championship of 1931, both topnotch distance horses and both winners of rich stakes.

Vander Pool and Jamestown have developed into crack sprinters. Vander Pool was unbeaten at the end of July and Jamestown fared well until an injury stopped him temporarily.

Don Leon, high in the list of last year's money winners, is the only one racing regularly which has failed to live up to his record as a two-year old. His campaign on western tracks, however, has netted him several purses.

The string of 195 beautiful fish were caught by Mr. Epley and party of Portland, fishing in East Lake, near Bend. In the fishing party were Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Lewis and Mr. and Mrs. Epley. The largest fish, measuring 24 inches, was caught by Mrs. Lewis.

Two photographs of another fine catch were received yesterday by The Mail Tribune from Sitcoos lake. Six very large big mouth bass, caught by W. W. Walker of this city, are shown in the photographs with the lucky fisherman and his son, Bill, who is witness to the fact that his dad caught the fish in a little less than one hour by the stop watch. The vertebrate of a whale found on the beach near Sitcoos is also included in the picture. According to Rainbow Gibson, who fishes the North Fork of the Umpqua each year, a good summer run of steelhead is now on there. The North Fork is a larger stream than the Rogue and has a larger supply of fish, but it is much more difficult to fish and for this reason the steelhead found there are often described as greater fighters than those in the Rogue. Experienced sportsmen, however, maintain that it isn't a difference in fish, but a difference in conditions.

The Umpqua is so rocky and lined with so much brush that wading is impossible. Hand casting is therefore used and the fisherman who lands a steelhead must carry on his battle from one location. He can not move up and down stream, trying out his prize as Rogue river anglers do.
