ASK BUDGETS OF COUNTY OFFICES

The county court today issued instructions to heads of all county offices to have their annual budget estimates of expenses for the year ready by Wednesday, August 19. This is five weeks earlier than usual, as heretofore the budget estimates have been prepared for presentation October 1.

The budget committee of three will be named within the next month and will start work September 1, also six weeks earlier than usual.

The early start is made so the budget committee, acting with the county court, will have plenty of time for preparation of the final budget.

It is expected there will be retrenchment in all departments, and a wholesale whacking of expenditures.

The first tax to receive the ax will be the dog tax, now levied at \$2 for male and \$3 for female dogs. The tax will probably be \$1 for all dogs, irrespective of sex. The last session of the legislature passed a law giving the county court unrestricted authority in collecting and fixing dog taxes.
