AUTOISTS SCURRY FOR OREGON TAGS ON POLICE THREAT

The last two days there has been a great demand for Oregon auto license plates by autoists heretofore flitting over the highways and byways flaunting California and Washington tags, the sheriff's office reports. The change of heart is credited to the announcement of the newly created state police that one of their initial activities would be checking up on foreign licensees.

Five Willamette valley and Portland residents with Washington license plates called yesterday and made application for home state plates. One of the "Washington residents" lived at Roseburg.

A number of Jackson county Californians also squared things with the secretary of state. A check-up will be made by the state police in the rural areas as well as the cities, and they will inspect the situation in the Prospect and Crater lake districts, where auto are secluded, it is said, in the tall timber while the owner works. There are also reported to be several autos in the far corners of the county that had no licenses last year or this. Owners will be requested to purchase for the present year, also for the one missed.

MILK ORDINANCES URGED TO GUARD HEALTH IN HOME

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 6.—(AP) Emergency city ordinances prohibiting the receiving of milk of a lower grade than "B raw" in city distributing plants, was urged of all localities where milk inspection has been inaugurated by Max Gehlar, director of agriculture. Letters making the request were sent out to Mayor P. M. Gregory of Salem and to other mayors over the state.

In the letter Gehlar says that "Oregon dairymen have invested over a million dollars at the request of city health authorities to produce a high grade milk for table consumption. As long as distributing plants in cities are permitted to receive milk of lower grade it is impossible for health authorities in the cities to be assured that none of the milk finds its way into homes."
