

HOOVER SEEKING HELP FOR SURVEY IN UNEMPLOYMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—President Hoover said today he was calling upon all available agencies to provide him with facts on unemployment.

The president said "while improvement in the situation in many directions seems promising, the problem, whatever it may be, will be met."

With the organized cooperation of local, state and federal authorities, and the numbers of relief and charitable organizations, he said, the problem "was successfully handled last winter."

"We shall adapt organization methods in such manner as may be necessary for the coming winter," the president said.

"The first of the facts to be determined is the probable volume of the load of distress which will need to be provided for"
