JUNIOR TITLE FOR STATE WON BY PORTLAND

Salem, Nosed Out 5 to 4 In Errorless Game—Iron Boy Pitcher Falls—Victory On a Bad Bounce.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Aug. 8.—(AP)—Portland won the American Legion Junior Baseball championship of Oregon today by defeating the Salem team 5 to 4 in the third game of the series. Portland will represent Oregon in the regional finals at Butte, Montana.

Both teams played errorless ball. The game was a pitchers' battle throughout, with both hurlers backed up by faultless fielding that resulted in the first errorless game seen on the college diamond in many years.

Salem called on Perrine again to pitch after he had won the first game and had worked as relief pitcher in yesterday's game. Lefty Leveson, Portland, was touched for hits early in the game but tightened up and allowed neither a hit nor a run after the fourth inning.

Salem led until the last of the fifth, collecting three runs in the sixth and another in the fourth. Portland failed to score until the fourth when Gordon started a rally which ended only after five hits and three runs had been counted. Portland got the winning score in the fifth on Geira's home run, a long fly to left field that took a bad hop past Tapp.

Gordon, Portland short stop, was adjudged the most valuable player and was awarded the Harry Dorman trophy. Dan Sowers, father of American Legion junior baseball, awarded the trophy.

CARELESS SMOKER STARTS ERUPTION IN WIZARD ISLAND

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., Aug. 8.—For the first time since it was in eruption countless centuries ago, columns of smoke arose Friday from Wizard Island, cinder cone in Crater Lake, and a portion of its rocks were hot as in the days of yore. A quarter of an acre of the island was involved and required the services of several park rangers to place the situation under control.

A careless smoker is believed to have discarded a cigarette as he was climbing about the island. The burning stub ignited a mass of decomposing leaves and peedies among the lava rocks and burned old dead logs that had lain there for innumerable years.

\$20,000 SUIT FILED IN VALLEY LAND DEAL

Pearl Wilson and L. M. Wilson yesterday filed suit in the circuit court for alleged breach of contract in the sum of \$20,000, against the Rogue River company, with head offices in Los Angeles, Calif.

Mrs. Wilson alleges in her complaint that the Rogue River company, despite frequent requests, failed to give her a clear and unrestricted title to acreage she purchased from the company, and that unbeknownst to her, at the time of the signing of the sale agreement, the mineral rights of the land are vested in others.

The complaint sets forth that the agreement was made to purchase the land, located in the southern part of the county, for \$15,000, and a balance due of \$6000 exists, final payment to be made in 1934. Mrs. Wilson asserts that she has offered to pay the balance, and that by reason of being unable to secure a clear title, has been unable to make the sale of the property for \$20,000.

Mrs. Wilson is represented by Attorney Gus Newbury, the defendant company by Attorney George M. Roberts.

HOLLY ASKS DAMAGE SUIT PLEA CHANGE

The Pacific States Theaters, Inc. (Holly theater) and John Niedermeier, manager, through their attorney, George M. Eberhart, yesterday filed a motion in the circuit court asking that Roy G. Petch, who is suing the defendants for \$15,000 for alleged injury to his eyesight, make more "definite and certain" portions of the complaint and eliminate other portions, held as irrelevant or immaterial.

The defense asks that there be stricken, portions of the complaint, citing "that plaintiff is the father of five minor children," and, references to medical views as to the future of his eyesight.

The defense also seeks to have the plaintiff to make more definite and certain when Petch alleges he warned Niedermeier against opening the door to a room containing powerful lights.

Petch alleges that while employed as a movie operator, he sustained injury to his eyesight through the alleged negligence of the defendants.
