All forest fires in Crater national forest and on state land in Jackson county were reported to be under control today as forestry offices here. Fires are still smoldering in sections of the Applegate country, but are patrolled and have not been spreading today.

The most recent fire in that area at Mule Hill was checked at midnight last night. The fire covered about 200 acres. Reports of the blaze were received here yesterday afternoon. Fifty men were rushed to the scene and had the fire surrounded after several hours' work. Most of the crew was returned to the city today. Men are still patrolling the area.

Word came from Forest creek today that the water supply was nearly exhausted in that area and that it was necessary to haul it into the country to extinguish fires there.

The Humburg fire was checked in the Forest creek hills when it spread toward Jacksonville.
