

Portland Legion Kids Drub Idaho 21 to 1; Play Seattle Next

OLD JUNIOR FOES MEET TONIGHT IN NORTHWEST FINAL

Injury to Idaho Catcher Ruins Morale of Team—Seattle Defeated by Portland in Former Tilts

BUTTE, Mont., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Oregon State Junior baseball champions overwhelmed Idaho's entry in the American Legion regional finals here yesterday, when its Portland team defeated Idaho 21 to 1. Seattle followed by defeating Miles City, Mont. 6 to 3. Portland and Seattle will battle tonight for the northwest championship and a trip to Colorado Springs to compete in the all-western finals.

Idaho's pitchers were pounded hard by the Portlanders. Shortstop Joe Gordon led the bombardment, hitting two homers. Adams, center-fielder and pitcher, also hit a homer. Vern Richards, catcher and center-fielder got five hits out of six times up.

Church, Idaho catcher, was unable to play because he was accidentally struck by a bat before the game. Smith, an infielder, took Church's place but home-town fans said Idaho's spirit seemed to have been impaired.

Idaho's lone run came in the second. Portland gathered 6 runs in the seventh inning, and 7 in the eighth.

Seattle and Portland have met three times in the last four years for the regional championship. Each time Portland has won.

A great deal of confusion has arisen over issuing licenses to non-resident minors, according to reports received here from H. L. Moreland, chief clerk of the state game commission.
It seems that many sportsmen have misunderstood the law and gained the impression that anyone under 14 years of age can fish without a license.
Under section 69, page 49, the game laws of Oregon provide that:
"No person over 14 years of age and no non-resident regardless of age, shall at any time, hunt or angle for any fish without first having procured a license to do so."
The fee for such license is \$3 and the game commission wishes to call attention of all sporting goods stores to the fact in order that the question may be settled, Moreland writes.
It is also unlawful for anyone to transplant fish from one stream to another without gaining permission of the game commission or other officials.

PINCH HITTERS DO JUST THAT THING AT PROPER TIME

Tom Jenkins of Browns Steps in to Deliver Homer—Hack Wilson Drives Pill Over Fence for Cubs

When a ball player goes into a game as a pinch batsman and hits a homer, it is a rare occurrence. There were two pinch homers yesterday.

Tom Jenkins of the St. Louis Browns hit one against the Boston Red Sox with two on bases, providing half the runs of their third inning, which brought the Browns a 2 to 6 victory. Hack Wilson, last year's home-run king of the National League, stepped in as a pinch batsman with two on base in the seventh inning of the Chicago Cubs' battle with the Phillies and nicked Phil Collins for a homer.

Collins, however, gained ample revenge for that blow in the same inning when he rapped out a single and drove in the run that gave the Phils a 4 to 3 triumph. Philadelphia made only four hits off Malone, who made only four hits off Malone every one of them was good for a run.

Cubs Drop to Third.
The defeat dropped the Cubs once more into third place as the New York Giants divided their second straight double-header with Pittsburgh. The Giants are only one point ahead and the teams are tied in games. Aided by a couple of costly Giant errors, Pittsburgh piled up four runs in the first inning to win the opener, 7 to 5. The Giants scored five times off Larry French in the first frame of the second game, to win, 6 to 1.

This change in the standing once more benefited the St. Louis Cardinals, who increased their margin of leadership to nine and a half games by trouncing Brooklyn for the third straight time, 8-5.
Pittsburgh's even break put the Pirates into a virtual tie for fifth place with Boston as the Cincinnati Reds rose up and slammed a double defeat onto the Braves.
Garner 22 Hits.
An assault that netted 22 hits, six by Tony Cuccinello, gave Cincinnati the first game, 17 to 3. In the second Johnson and Frey held the Braves to four hits while Cuccinello broke loose again, hitting a homer with two on base in the eighth for a 4 to 2 victory.
Philadelphia's Athletics, aided considerably by the Chicago White Sox, made their American league lead 11 games over Washington. A four-hit pitching performance by Rube Walberg gave the A's a 5 to 2 triumph over Detroit while Chicago downed Washington, 10 to 8.
New York and Cleveland just got their second inning started when rain came along and washed out the program.

LORD LONSDALE FORCED TO SELL RACE STRING

LONDON, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The Daily Herald says Lord Lonsdale, one of Great Britain's most famous sportsmen, has decided to sell his large racing establishment.

JOB WITH FORD FOR KID M'COY AWAITS PAROLE

Former Middleweight Champion Will Leave Prison December, 1932—Fine Record Wins Clemency

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Calif., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Prison gates will open December 11, 1932, for Norman Selby, who is better known to the sport world as "Kid McCoy," former world champion middleweight prizefighter.
And when Selby walks from prison, he won't be without a job. He will go to Dearborn, Michigan, to work for Henry Ford as physical instructor in Ford's automobile plant.
Selby was committed April 11, 1928, and since his incarceration for assault with a deadly weapon and manslaughter, has been a model prisoner. His conviction grew out of the death of his sweetheart, Theresa Mori, in Los Angeles, who Selby was alleged to have killed.
Because of his excellent prison record, the state prison board yesterday decided to give Selby his six years on parole. He will actually leave the prison six years ago to rehabilitate himself in civil life.
As head of the San Quentin department, Selby became one of the best known prisoners here. He was chief of the department for many years, and retained the rank of captain when a civilian chief was appointed.
