ROMANCE LURKS IN TEXAS GIRL'S PRINCELY HOME

Marriage of Aleene McFarland and Prince Johann Recalls Anthony Hope's Ruritania Love Stories

Liechtenstein, the Alpine principality which leaped into the news in the United States through the marriage in London of Prince Johann of Liechtenstein to Miss Aleene McFarland of Weatherford, Texas, recalls the heyday of Anthony Hope and his Ruritania stories and plays.

Romance lurks in every corner of this little principality, bordered by the Rhine, wedged in between Austria and Switzerland and studded with stage mountains which rise to a height of over 8000 feet.

The principality is only 65 square miles in area. It has only about 11,000 inhabitants, and its capital, Vaduz, is a village of less than 2000. Although the principality was not founded until 1719, the ruling family dates back to the 13th century.

Land of Vudlers. Liechtenstein was part of the Holy Roman Empire. In the early years of the 19th century it was included in the Rhine federation and from 1815 until 1866 it was in the German federation. Since 1866 it has been wholly independent and without any army.

Despite the lack of military uniforms there is plenty of picturesque background. That is supplied by the standardized garb of civil employes and the colorful peasant costumes, fashioned after those of the Austrian Tyrol. It is a land of yodelers and shepherds and wine-growers, a land of corn, cattle and sheep.

Prince Johann, who is expected to visit the United States with his bride, is the third line of descent in the royal family. The present ruler, Prince Francis, is 78 years old and has no children. He was a bachelor until a year ago. But the second line of succession contains a score of princes of all ages, so there is little likelihood that Prince Johann will ever rule the tiny realm.

Prince Johann was formerly an Austrian midshipman. Until 1919 Liechtenstein was closely allied with Austria. It adopted Swiss currency in 1921 and has been in the Swiss Customs Union for seven years. Switzerland also administers its telegraph and postal service.

In the great war Liechtenstein declared its neutrality, but Austria declared it within the war zone. The little principality tried to get into the League of Nations, but was rejected. It suffered terrible economic depression as a result of its isolation during the war.

Prince Francis I, the present ruler, succeeded his brother in 1929 and gave up all his estate except 22 castles before he ascended the throne.

9 AIR SPEED MARKS IN EUROPE BY HAWKS

NEW YORK.—(AP)—Capt. Frank Hawks, speedy commercial flier, traveled 20,000 miles in his three-months' tour of Europe. He returned with nine records to his credit, two of them representing lowering of his own marks. His best average speed was 222.2 miles an hour, made by flying from London to Berlin, a distance of 600 miles, in two hours and 57 minutes. The lowest average speed was made between Copenhagen and Amsterdam, 184 miles an hour. Six of his records were of 200 or more miles an hour.

GRASSHOPPERS DEVOUR TONGUE OF CULTIVATOR

KEARNEY, Neb.—(UP)—A farmer northwest of here reported that the grasshoppers which ravaged crops in central Nebraska this summer ate the oak tongue out of a corn cultivator. State Entomologist Gates, who heard the story, said it was "believeable" because the hoppers were hungry for salt and the tongue had been made salty by twenty horses rubbing against it.

RUSSIANS NEED TOURIST MONEY FOR TRADE USE

Dollars in Great Demand—Special Stores in Moscow Cater to Foreigners—Ruble Is Not Wanted

By Stanley P. Richardson MOSCOW.—(AP) Dollars are in great demand in Russia. Since the rouble has no standing in international exchange, the government needs dollars—as well as other foreign currencies—with which to settle for its purchases abroad.

Getting them from foreigners is one way of obtaining them. As the sole shop-keeper of the nation, the government for this purpose, and also for the convenience of strangers in Russia, has set up special stores in Moscow and other centers, catering to foreigners and in which only "valuta," or foreign money, may be spent.

Tempt Tourist Purchases. These stores are called "torgsin" (trade with foreigners), and the goods they offer include both food and general merchandise of a type far above that for sale to the proletarian population in the stores at which only accredited citizens of

the U. S. S. R. may trade. Here one may buy china, antique rugs, linens, furniture, food delicacies which have no place in the ordinary shops and wide varieties of clothing, all at prices which are reasonable compared to the general cost of living in Russia. Similarly two of the better hotels in Moscow accept only "valuta." One of them recently opened an American bar and restaurant as an attraction for visitors. Here tourists can dine, dance to jazz band music and drink the offerings of pre-prohibition America—but only for "valuta."
