

DOUBLE SLAYING DONE IN DEFENSE, CLARK DECLARES

Former Assistant Prosecutor of Los Angeles Reveals Details Fatal Gun Play in Politician's Office

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—(AP)—David H. Clark, former assistant district attorney, faced the task today of defending, in cross-examination, his story of how he killed Herbert P. Spencer and Charles H. Crawford, political figures, in self-defense.

Special Prosecutor W. J. Ford planned to subject the former deputy district attorney and municipal judge candidate to a thorough questioning of his story, which was filled with political intrigue. Ford had begun his attack when court adjourned yesterday.

Quietly and calmly, Clark, on trial for murder as the result of the slaying last May 20, told how he had killed the two men "to save my own life."

Clark had gone to the office of Crawford to seek the latter's support. In exchange for the favors sought of Crawford, the one-time political boss and alumnus wanted Clark to "frame" Chief of Police Roy E. Steckel, Clark said.

"I said to Crawford: 'You dirty, low-down dog, asking me to frame a friend of mine. You framed Jacobson (a city councilman) but you can't get me. I'm going to tell the public, over the radio and from the platform, just what's happened in this office.'"

Clark said Crawford reached for a gun. "I believed Charles Crawford was going to kill me, and I shot him," said Clark. "Then Crawford shouted 'Get him here,' just before I fired. I whirled around. Spencer was coming for me. He was reaching toward his hip pocket. I turned my gun and fired."
