VARIATIONS SEEN IN BUTTER MARKET; FAT EASES TONE. PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Advance of 1c dozen in the price of all grades of eggs is announced for Saturday morning by the Pacific co-ops. This follows strength and advances in the eastern trade. PORTLAND, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Market for butter is more or less spotted. Not only does this apply to volume of make, but to the trading trend. Receipts from country creameries showed a liberal decrease in the last few days while the week to date showed a small decrease in the home churning compared with the same period last week. In the local field the situation appears mixed as to manufacture. Some plants report a liberal gain while others show a decrease. Butterfat values are just about holding, with some indications of slight easiness in spots. General trading trend in the market for eggs remains stationary. Steadiness is reflected in the market for live chickens. Demand for dressed hen turkeys continues good with trading still almost exclusively confined to the 28c mark. General strength is showing for peaches with a more persistent call for northwest stock because of superior quality. Prices are hardening somewhat. Californians moving slowly at higher prices. Strength of the market for country killed calves and especially the better sorts of lightweights, continues here with no change in the price list. Hogs and lambs are steady. Beef continues slow. Potato market is very quiet and confined to local business. Watermelon market slow for California, with prospects of Oregon stock next week. Market sales for Bartlett pears here are almost confined to the Rogue river stock. Best at \$2, Yakima \$1.75.
