ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—Roy Pieter, North Umpqua rancher, who had what he described as a pitched battle with Emory Davis on the Fish creek burn Wednesday, reached Roseburg today and delivered Davis' revolver to the sheriff. He expected, he said, that Davis would have obtained a warrant for his arrest, charging assault, and said he was ready to surrender. Davis, however, had taken no action today. TEXAS REPUBLICAN ON TRIP HERE SAYS DEPRESSION ENDED

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., Aug. 14.—Normal business conditions are returning and the present so-called depression is nearing its end, declared Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach, Seguin, Texas, representative for the 14th Texas district, when a visitor at Crater Lake Friday while on a tour of the Pacific coast. He scoffed at the idea that any part of the conditions should be laid at the door of the governmental administration. The low ebb of present business would have occurred to any other administration, he said, and added that depressions occur only so long until better times ensue. Congressman Wurzbach is serving his sixth term from Texas and said he is the third Republican in the history of the state to have been elected to the House of Representatives and only one to have served six terms. Through the introduction of a bill in congress, he made possible the establishment at San Antonio of the largest military air field in the nation. The air field development is now well underway, with a sum of 14 million dollars expended so far. It is approximately two thirds completed, and has already been termed the "West Point of the air."
