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## CHIEF JOHN COPS ILLINOIS HANDICAP

**HAWTHORNE RACE TRACK, CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—(AP)—**In a sensational driving finish Chief John won the Illinois owners' handicap today by the margin of a nose before 30,000 sweltering spectators, the biggest crowd that ever jammed the historic Hawthorne race course.

Chief John, whose victory was a surprise, won over Alderman J. J. Coughlin's Karl Eitel, with Knight Commander, owned by James Norris, Jr., youthful Chicago sportsman, a half length back in third place and Paul Bunyan, a fast charging fourth, only a head back of Knight Commander.

The Illinois owners' handicap is a sporting event for turf men, who are bona fide residents of the state. A field of eleven went to the post, giving the stake a gross value of \$12,500, with \$8,425 going to the triumphant owner.

## IRISH BATTLE AND SING ALL DAY AT ARMAGH

**BELFAST, Northern Ireland, Aug. 15.—(AP)—**Police reinforcements were rushed tonight to Armagh, northern Ireland, after a day of battling between Orangemen and delegates to the assembly of the Ancient Order of Hibernians.

The reinforcements were dispatched after leaders on both sides had vainly appealed to their followers to keep the peace.

Irish nationalists in street demonstrations shouted "Up, Dublin!" and "Up, De Valera!" and the Orangemen retaliated by singing "Derry's Walls."

Many windows were shattered and police feared that they might obtain arms.

The day's troubles started with the wrecking of a locomotive near Rich Hill, county Armagh, by a group of about 20 men who shot one warning bullet in the direction of Henry Bell, engineer, and told him he would get the next one if he didn't obey them, then they ripped up a section of the track and, detaching the locomotive from its train, forced Bell to start it toward the gap.

This was interpreted as a reprisal measure against the "Irish republican army" which prevented Orangemen from holding a meeting at Cooehill in county Cavan, on the southern side of the Free Stage-ular border last Wednesday.

In Armagh today clashes between the Hibernians and Orangemen were frequent, and police, swinging their batons, waded in time after time in an attempt to quell the disturbances.

Each time they were dispersed, the fighters collected elsewhere and started over again.

Sir William Allen, grand master of the Armagh Orangemen, said he regarded the Rich Hill incident with grave disquiet.

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—**What method the farm board finally will adopt to assist the southern cotton farmer in his low price dilemma tonight held the close interest of Washington.

Hope has been virtually abandoned for its proposal that a third of the current crop be destroyed and stabilization supplies held off the market for a year.

At least five actual rejections have been received from the 14 governors who were asked to join in the program.

There apparently is no immediate prospect of concerted state action although many suggestions to that end have gone out. The disposition seems to be to leave the actual formulation of an acceptable, workable plan squarely up to the board to be worked out from the many counter proposals put forward by governors, senators and planters.

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## ECONOMY APPEAL MADE TO BRITISH TO SLASH BUDGET

**LONDON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—**Economy appeals reminiscent of World War days were heaped to Great Britain today as the government prepared to slash national expenditures in an effort to remove the threat of a budget deficit of about \$800,000.

Home Secretary J. R. Clynes called on young men growing up "who know nothing whatever of what life was like during the latter years of the World War" to give their closest attention to "the lead given by the unity of political parties in the country in the face of a crisis which must be overcome."

From his native village of Loesemouth, Scotland, Prime Minister MacDonald counseled the nation to be ready for sacrifices.

Vital decisions affecting every citizen of the country are expected within the next few days.

The cabinet economy committee will discuss the economy report submitted by Sir George May and will continue formulating its remedial proposals Monday and Tuesday. Wednesday there will be a special emergency cabinet meeting.

## GIRDLERS FINED BY JAPAN PLAN SUIT TO RECoup

**TOKYO, Aug. 1.—(Sunday)—(AP)** Two American aviators, fined \$2,000 because they flew into Japan without observing the country's air regulations, decided philosophically today they might have had a worse "break."

His flying mate, Hugh Herndon, Jr., of New York, who kissed his bride goodbye to fly around the world with Pangborn, contented himself with remarking the workhouse was waiting should they fail to pay the fine assessed. They were told by newspaper dispatches that the money was already on the way from New York.

Their greatest worry now is whether they are to be given a chance to recoup their financial losses at the hands of the Japanese courts by being permitted to fly from here to Seattle for that \$25,000 prize.

The authorities have not yet decided whether to issue the men a permit to fly from here to Samushiro, where the start for Seattle would be made. Some feel issuance of such a permit might be out of place in view of the court's action against the fliers. Announcement of a decision may be made tomorrow.

## GUARD FOR CLARK, WARD BOSS KILLER, AFTER DEATH NOTE

**LOS ANGELES, Aug. 15.—(AP)—**When David H. Clark, one time deputy district attorney who is on trial for murder, again takes the stand Monday morning to complete his testimony on cross-examination, he will be under armed guard. All spectators and witnesses will be searched for firearms before allowed entrance to the courtroom.

Superior Judge Stanley Murray, who is presiding over the trial of the former young prosecutor accused of slaying Herbert F. Spencer, editor of a political magazine and an intimate of politicians, made the order after Mrs. Nancy Malone Clark, wife of the defendant, revealed she had received a note, believed to be the stand testimony of a woman as she was leaving the crowded courtroom late yesterday. The note read:

"Mr. Clark: Watch out for a man, rather stout, in light suit, straw hat. He carries a gun. You will understand."

## MICHIGAN OPENS WAR ON HIGHWAY ROBBERS, RESORTS

**ANN ARBOR, Mich., Aug. 15.—(AP)**—A concerted effort to drive robbers off Michigan highways and to close the roadhouses and resorts where they congregate were being planned tonight as an aftermath of the slaying of two boys and two girls near Ypsilanti early Tuesday.

Plans for such a drive were announced at Petoskey today by Gov. Wilbur M. Brucker. Washtenaw county authorities continued efforts to round up associates of Fred Smith, Frank Oliver and David T. Blackstone, negro, the convicted slayers of the young couple.

Other officials spent the day questioning the three slayers at the Michigan state prison where they were taken Thursday night after being sentenced to life imprisonment but found the prisoners unwilling to talk. They were unable to get them to admit a connection with numerous "petting party" robberies in Washtenaw county.

Catherine Keller, Smith's sweetheart, was being held tonight and the officers were endeavoring to determine what connection, if any, she had with the quadruple slaying.

Five other men, believed implicated in "petting party" robberies in the county were arrested late today.
