County Officers Reduce Expense List For Budget

Total Decrease \$3852 to Date in Framing 1932 Requirements—Committee Will Be Named Soon

In accordance with instructions of the county court issued two weeks ago, 1932 budget estimates have been furnished by county officers and will be formally presented Wednesday, at the regular session of the county court. The total decrease to date amounts to \$3852.50.

No decrease in the budget estimates over last year is anticipated for the county treasurer's office, county assessor, or expenses of the circuit court. Treasurer A. C. Walker and Assessor J. B. Coleman said this morning that "because" as these departments have hewed to the line, further cuts were not possible.

The expenses of the circuit court, largely confined to juror payments for the coming year, have been estimated at \$10,980, the same as last year.

Many Offices Cut
Cuts in the other office expenses range from the \$2012.90 decrease in county clerk's department to the \$290 slack in the county court expenditures. Most of the slashes affect the employment of extra help.

The county clerk's estimates call for a \$960 decrease in typists' pay, \$100 decrease for extra help, \$800 for printing and record books, \$100 less for postage and stationery, and \$50 for typewriter supplies and repairs. The budget last year totalled \$15,447.50 against an estimated \$13,435 the coming year.

The sheriff's office budget estimate calls for a decline of \$1310, including decrease in the handling of civil and criminal cases \$500, extra help legal and jail department \$500 and \$510 for equipment maintenance and incidental expenses. The budget allowance last year was \$19,413; next year's estimate, \$18,000.

The county court budget estimates call for a \$220 reduction—\$100 less for traveling expenses and \$120 less per year for stenographer hire. Last year's budget called for \$2500; the 1932 appropriation for \$4980.

The district attorney's office estimates a \$310 decrease over last year confined to less light, fewer law books and less transcription of the records.

The county engineer's office as yet has not filed a budget estimate, along with the school superintendent, watermaster and the health department.

The county court will name a budget committee before September 1. A number of citizens are being considered, but the personnel will not be announced until later. The consideration of the budget for the coming year will start six weeks earlier than usual and there will likely be a paring of county expenses in all departments and branches.

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Deny Dr. Wilson Plans Resigning County Position

Attorney George M. Roberts, counsel for Dr. B. C. Wilson, county physician, appeared before the county court this morning and was granted an extension of "a week or ten days" in which to file a memorandum in behalf of his client. Attorney Roberts said that the memoranda would be in the nature of a statement, showing the extent of Dr. Wilson's activities in health work and expenditures and savings.

Attorney Roberts declared, "I can assure the court that Dr. Wilson will not resign."

The attorney said that newspaper reports, predicting this, "prejudiced the case," and that Dr. Wilson was entitled to consideration "upon something more than evidence that would not be permissible in a higher court." Attorney Roberts said that a grand jury investigation was welcomed. He declared that the "present dissension and turmoil was due to a disturbing factor, now removed."

Dr. Wilson is assuming the role of a political pawn," he said. "The county court last week heard the defense side at a hearing and held a decision in abeyance. The action this morning delays it further."

The present situation was brought about by Dr. Wilson ousting Mrs. Lydia King who shortly afterwards filed various charges, alleging misuse of funds, appropriating county medicine, alcohol for social use and accepting a \$20 check from an aged Gold Hill district resident, and allegedly converting it to purchase Christmas presents for county poor farm attendants.

Applegate Fire Quickly Placed Under Control

The Sunday hoodoo resting on the Crater National forest, in that most big forest fires have been starting on that day, this summer, especially in the Applegate district, ran true to form yesterday, only in a lesser degree, as the new fire starting in that section had covered only an area of about 150 acres in brush and timber, by 7:30 o'clock this morning when it came under control, having caused but little commercial damage.

This was independent of the eight fires caused by the electrical storm of last night, caused by lightning striking trees along the Cascade divide. These fires were all small ones, according to information given out by the forestry headquarters here, causing little trouble, and were looked after by the regular patrols in the respective sections in which they occurred.

The fire in the Applegate district started in the Deming creek section at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon from an unknown cause, but suspected to be of incendiary origin, and spread fast. During the afternoon the Crater National forest office headquarters here sent 120 fire fighters, gathered in Medford, to the scene, and the work of those men during the afternoon, last night and early today succeeded in checking the fire.

The task of lessening the force at the fire and returning the men to Medford began this forenoon, but a large number were left to patrol the fire lines and look after general mopping up work.
