EDMISTON, BOGGS AND REDDY MAKE SINGLES SWEEP

Lithians Wage Stubborn Battle On Home Courts—Early and Pruitt Win Doubles—Girls Defeated

Although encountering unexpected resistance in contrast to their 6-0 triumph of a fortnight ago, Medford's tennis team showed too much power for the Lithians' forces when they defeated them 5-2 in a hard match on the Ashland courts yesterday. Regaining his facile stroking after a sensational dive through the fence, Jimmie Edmiston, local number one man managed to run out the final two sets from Dick Jay, Beaver courtman, after a dazed and shaken start due to his injury.

The Oregon State youth nosed him out at 15-13, in the first set, but Edmiston took the final two sets 6-3, 6-4. Cool, effortless play on the part of Carter Boggs gave the locals their next advantage, when his steady game accounted for Prescotts of Ashland to the tune of 6-3, 6-4, and John Reddy made the singles a clean sweep for Medford by administering a 6-3, 6-1 loss to Howard Woodson. Woodson's great service piled up 17 aces in the opening set, but dwindled as the match progressed.

CARDS EASY FOR GIANT SOUTHPAW IN OPENING TILT

Walker Turns in Second Two-Hit Game Against Leaders—Cubs and Robins Win in Double Bills

Fullerton, Jr. (Associated Press Sports Writer) If the New York Giants had an entire pitching staff of men as successful as Southpaw William Walker, they might now hold the place of the St. Louis Cardinals at the top of the National league standing instead of being virtually tied with the Chicago Cubs, 9 1/2 games behind the Cards and one slim point ahead of Chicago.

Walker, the leading Giant pitcher, has won his last five starts and in two games against the Cardinals has left the league champions and prospective pennant winners down with four hits. He turned in a second two-hit game against St. Louis in the first half of yesterday's double header to win by a 7 to 1 count after beating them 4-0 July 18, Hubbell falls.

Carl Hubbell, Walker's equally left handed running mate, was not so successful in the second half of the double header. He gave the Cards a run in the first inning and the Giants never overcame that margin against Flint Rhem's fine mound work. Frank Frisch clouted a homer with one aboard in the eighth to provide the margin of victory in the Cards' 3-2 triumph.
