

CUBS WIN TWICE IN FINAL EFFORT TO CATCH CARDS

Take Another Double Header From Braves to Grab Second Place From Giants —Malone in Fine Fettle

The Chicago Cubs, picked in April to give the champion St. Louis Cardinals a fight for the National league pennant, apparently have decided a little late in the day to do something about the runaway Cards have made of the race in the Heydler circuit.

Winning their second doubleheader with the Boston Braves in as many days, the Cubs charged past the New York Giants into second place yesterday and today stood a mere 8 1/2 games to the rear of the high-flying Cardinals. The Giants, splitting a double bill with the champions, fell into third place a full game behind the Cubs.

Malone in Form
Pat Malone turned in one of his very best performances in the opener against the Braves which the Cubs won 8-1. Malone allowed only three singles while his mates pounded Cunningham and Cantwell for ten. The fortunes of war shifted swiftly for Handy Moore, Braves third sacker, in the nightcap which went ten innings before the Cubs won 5-2. Moore drove in the two tying runs with a triple in the eighth but his wild throw in the tenth put Charlie Grimm on base and the Cub veteran later scored the winning run off Bell's single.

Home runs by Jim Bottomley and Chick Hafey in the eighth gave the Cubs a 6-5 win over the Giants in the first game but the Giants took the second, 7-5.

Brooklyn Loses Two
Brooklyn lost more ground as the Cincinnati Reds took two games, 4-1 and 8-3, behind the great pitching by Silas Johnson and Owen Carroll.

Larry French, Pittsburgh Pirate southpaw, stopped the Phillies 4-2, in the first game of double-header, allowing only six hits, but Phil Collins gave the Quakers an even break by blanking the Corsairs, 3-0, in the nightcap.

In the American league, the New York Yankees, holding third place, fell to a position five games from the Washington Senators and 16 from the Philadelphia Athletics by accepting an 8-2 trimming from Detroit.

An early attack on Pat Caraway gave the Boston Red Sox a 9-2 decision over the White Sox.

All other American league clubs had an off day.

Shade last night easily outpointed Wild Willie in a 10-round bout at White City, taking nine rounds.

The elimination tournament will officially start at Milwaukee August 25, with three bouts. Tatt Littman, Cudahy, Wis., will meet Ham Jenkins of Denver; Gorilla Jones, Akron, O., will tackle Tiger Thomas, Lelleville, Pa., and Rudy Marshall, Hartford, Conn., will meet Clyde Chastain of Texas.

Football Stadia Should Stand Share In Taxation

NEW YORK, Aug. 18. — (AP) — Henry Smith Pritchett, president of the Carnegie Endowment for the Advancement of Teaching, suggests taxation of football stadia.

"A stadium like the Yale bowl or the one recently erected at South Bend (Notre Dame)," he declares in his annual report published today, "is used merely for public show."

"Will not the various states insist (and rightly so) upon taxing money-earning agencies of his description? An agency that takes in \$400,000 at a

single show is in no position to ask for the exemption of this money-earner from taxation.

"The boys who are summoned to the football colors at the end of August are called to no boys' game. They are to be drilled under professional trainers for a grueling contest for which the public will pay handsomely. The exploitation of the student, his diversion from genuine college study and social life, his service under professional trainers, all are in preparation for a commercial show before the public."

YOUNG STRIBLING SAYS SCHMELING BEST OF HEAVIES

Dempsey Can't Come Back, Is View — Sharkey No Match for Real Heavyweight — Carnera Just Big

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 18.—(AP) W. L. (Young) Stribling isn't optimistic over the chances of any present day heavyweights taking Max Schmeling's measure for a while yet.

The Georgian, vacationing here, of course entertains the idea that he can whip the German who scored a technical knockout over him several weeks ago to retain the world's heavyweight boxing title but doesn't favor the chances of the rest, including Jack Dempsey, Jack Sharkey, Primo Carnera, Mickey Walker and Tommy Loughran.

"I don't think Dempsey will ever get back into a championship campaign," opines Stribling. "He always could hit, but he won't be as fast as he used to be and if he can't land he'll probably be badly beaten."

Discounts Sharkey "If Sharkey can't beat a fighter Walker's size he can't expect to beat a real heavyweight."

"Carnera is just a great big man, and that lets him out."

"Loughran of course merits consideration but he isn't as spry as he once was."

"Walker is too small to fight a good heavyweight."

Stribling gives as his reasons for the Schmeling victory the fact that he was overtrained, and that he underestimated the German. He is not ready to quit the ring and is certain he would defeat Schmeling if they meet again.

Retirement from the ring, he insists, is in the "dim, distant future."

ENVOY'S DAUGHTER SWIMS DIFFICULT BOSPHORUS STRAIT

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Aug. 18.—(AP) Anita Grew, 22-year-old daughter of United States Ambassador Joseph C. Grew, today swam the 19 miles of the Bosphorus straits from the Black sea to the Sea of Marmora in five hours.

She had been training for the feat since she tried it and failed because of adverse winds and choppy seas last year. Today she finished the difficult swim apparently with plenty of reserve strength.

Her father and two friends followed her in a small boat, playing music on a phonograph and feeding her hot chocolate from time to time. Her mother and other friends met her at the famous Banders Tower where the Bosphorus enters the Sea of Marmora.

Mrs. Grew used the breast stroke over the whole distance.

HELSINGFORS, Finland, Aug. 18.—(AP)—M. Laas, an Estonian, swam the Gulf of Finland today from Nargoe Island to Porkala Beacon, covering the 25 miles in 22 hours.

Game Warden Roy Parr has returned here from Gold Beach and the mouth of Rogue river, and reports that commercial fishermen went on a strike last week, which lasted two days. Roderic McCleay, owner of the cannery there, refused to purchase any salmon less than 12 pounds. The fishermen wanted to sell salmon weighing as low as eight pounds.

McCleay ended the strike by accepting the fishermen's demands. Parr stated, and is now paying four cents a pound for the smaller fish, and eight cents for the larger ones.

The law demands nothing smaller than an 8-inch mesh net be used, and authorities say this size will not stop the salmon as small as eight pounds, unless they get caught by the mouth on a string of the net. Parr reported there were about 50 nets across the river.

DEMPSEY EXHIBITION IS MOVED OUTDOORS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 18. — (AP) — Jack Dempsey's four-round appearance here the night of August 24 will be staged outdoors, in the Multnomah civic stadium, Ralph H. Gruman, promoter, has announced. First announcement placed the show in the civic auditorium.

Only one of the four opponents to be provided Dempsey has been signed by Gruman, who said fighters seemed to hesitate about entering the ring with the ex-champion. The one is Big Bill Hartwell, Oakland, Cal., negro.

Sox and Yankee Base Stealers to Stage Foot Race

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—(AP) A foot race of 100 yards between Ben Chapman of the New York Yankees, the leading base stealer of the major leagues, and Carl Reynolds, fleet White Sox outfielder, will be held during the Yankee-Sox series here next week.

The Yankee, Babe Ruth particularly, think Chapman is the fastest man in the American league, while the White Sox believe Reynolds can outfoot him on the straightaway.

Ruth recently won himself a good sized bet backing Chapman against Allen "Dusty" Cooke, a teammate, at 100 yards.

Deer hunters are now watching the sky in anticipation of rain before September 20, when the hunting season opens officially. In previous years when the woods have been in a dry condition, the governor has postponed the hunting season until the danger of forest fires had passed.

In a case recently tried in which a Salem attorney questioned the governor's power, the supreme court ruled the executive was without authority. However the forest service, both state and federal, land to hunting.

The deer season will probably open on September 20, but no hunting will be allowed except on private property is the current opinion.

Probability that hunting will be good in the hills back of Ashland is forecast by the fact that recent fires in the Applegate country caused the animals to enter the hills near Ashland, and the Cascades. Residents in the Applegate section reported seeing several bands of deer moving in that direction.

A man living near the city limits in Jacksonville last week told of seeing a wildcat near his chicken house. He called to his wife to bring a gun, but the animal fled. It was thought the cat had been driven to the valley by the forest fires.
