Roscoe Stewart, 17-year-old Ashland youth, arrested last week on a charge involving a 13-year-old Ashland girl, and remanded to the juvenile court yesterday, was sentenced late yesterday by Judge Alex Sparrow to an indefinite term in the state reform school and then granted a parole. 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SHEEP HERDER FINED FOR CAUSING BLAZE

The Crater national forest headquarters office here announces, through H. A. Ritter, ranger of the Lake of the Woods area, in the city today on business, and who made the arrest of Ben Quinlan of Merrill, a sheepherder who accidentally started the big Aspen Butte fire in Klamath county on August 3, which burned over an area of 1500 acres in fir and western pine, and on which about 250 fire fighters worked until it was controlled, the majority from Medford, that Quinlan was fined \$50 in justice court at Keno yesterday.

Excursion Rates Cram Trains For Italian Week End

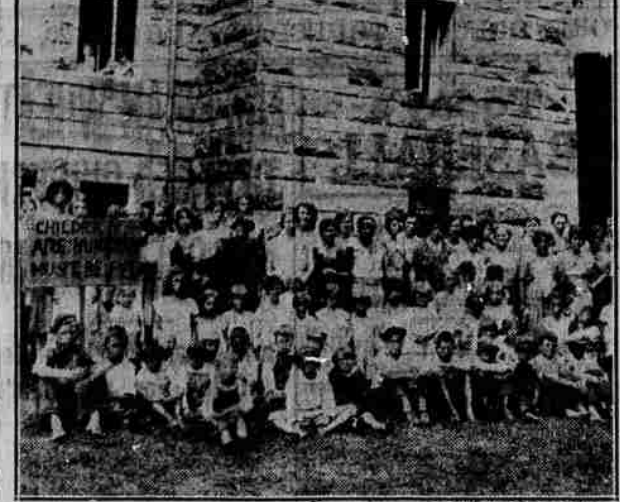
ROME (AP)—Italy has suddenly become excursion mad as a result of cut fares on state railroads.

One Sunday 150,000 persons entrained from the big cities of Milan, Rome, Venice and Naples on excursions arranged by Minister of Communications (Lano).

The trips ran from 40 to 175 miles away and return the same day. The round trip fare between Milan and Venice was 95 cents for the total of 350 miles.

This particular trip attracted 8,400 passengers. They rode in seven trains of 15 third-class coaches.

More than 150 women and children of Galloway, W. Va., journeyed from their homes to Phillip, W. Va., in an effort to secure the release of their husbands and fathers. The miners, 33 of them, were jailed for picketing mine despite an injunction against it. The families are shown in front of the court house with placards begging for the men's release. The group was led by local citizens and returned to their homes, their march a failure.

SMOLDERING FIRE SPRINGS TO LIFE AT 4-MILE LAKE

A small lightning fire which had been smoldering in a tree since the electrical storm Sunday night, broke into flames at Four Mile lake yesterday and had burned over an area of one acre when 20 men were sent to quell it—ten from Medford, 5 from Klamath Falls and 5 from Lake of the Woods. Nothing direct had been heard from the fire by this noon, but from the fact that Crater National forest lookouts report the smoke decreasing today, it is thought that it has been checked.

No other new fires had been reported in the Crater forest up to noon today.

F. H. Brundage, assistant regional forester and Norman White, deputy supervisor of the forest returned last evening from having spent yesterday in experimenting with the new caterpillar fire-fighting equipment at the old fire burning on Owen-Oregon lumber company lands near Butte Falls. Mr. White reports that the caterpillar, with its plug attachment will be efficacious in fighting forest fires under normal conditions, as shown by yesterday's experiments, but cannot be used in rocky land, as rocks would prevent the plow from making furrows.

This caterpillar equipment is for use in the Crater National, Siskiyou National, and Umpqua National forests only, with Medford as headquarters, to be moved to whatever forest is in need of its services during a big forest fire.

Modern Youngsters In Flying Nursery

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Three modern youngsters arrived today at Roosevelt field in their "flying nursery"—an exclusive play-room in the cabin of a transport airplane.

ROSEBURG POLICE PROVE BAD SHOTS

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 20.—(AP)—An unidentified extortionist escaped through a hall of bullets fired at him by local officers here last night.

A Roseburg business man, receiving threatening letters which demanded payment of \$1000, turned the letters over to the district attorney, Guy Cerdon, and Sheriff C. T. Jackson. Upon their instruction the business man placed a can, stuffed with paper, beside a telephone pole on an unimproved street in the extreme south part of the city.

Officers, in hiding, waited nearby and presently saw a man appear and pick up the can. They ordered him to halt but he turned and fled. The officers fired several shots, none of which, apparently, took effect.

Mystery in Murder of Former Marine

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Police were seeking the solution to an apparent murder mystery here today. The body of Felix Williams, former non-commissioned officer in the U. S. Marine corps, was found in his apartment last night—spraddled to his bed, tightly lashed, beaten, gagged and strangled.

Police said Williams had apparently been dead five days. There were no signs of a struggle in the room.
