

CHICKEN MARKET BOOMED BY FIGHT TO GAIN CONTROL

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Fight for control of the local chicken market continues unabated here. In fact a greater demand for offerings in the California trade started another rumpus in the buying price here. Some of the packers were inclined to grab the big profits offered by the increased California price of holding down the local price but others appeared with a higher price for buying here and shipped the beans.

Demand for chickens includes all lines. There is at the moment a very keen call for all sorts and especially so for the young stuff. All broilers are in call and at full prices. Best demand is for light weights, which are scarce and find southern favor at an advancing price.

Generally steady trading tone is reflected in the market for butter with no change in current values on the open market.

Generally maintained values are shown in the local egg market with the co-ops quoting unchanged values. Receipts of eggs continue to dwindle and there is much trouble regarding quality.

Demand for top quality light weight country killed calves is very good. Hogs are a trifle easy with demand for lambs is fair.

Market for cantaloupes is in bad shape with much odd and end stuff arriving. Prices are weak to extremely low with distributors meeting competition. Quality in general is below average.

Tomatoes show a slightly softer tone here. General top is around 50c box.

There is an acute shortage of good head lettuce at this time.

Peas trade is a trifle easy with more canning stock offering.
