SHOWGIRL FRIEND OF MISSING JAP UNDERGOES QUIZ

Former Wife Charles Chaplin Also Questioned In Disappearance Of Rich Oriental From Ship.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—(AP) The mysterious disappearance of Hisashi Yamaguchi, Japanese importer, of New York, from the liner Belgenland last week will be investigated by a federal grand jury.

The United States Attorney announced that Miss Mary Showgirl, companion of the missing man on a six-day cruise to Hawaii, had been asked to appear before a grand jury on Monday. She was questioned in private yesterday for four hours.

She is said to be friendly with the Japanese for several months before she sailed with him and his seven-year-old daughter on the Belgenland.

Miss Reiser, known on the stage as Mary Dale, said she attended a party last Friday given by the missing man's former wife, Mrs. Charles Chaplin. She was gone three days on her return to her state.

She told federal authorities, however, she was not until several hours after her return that a steward notified her that a man was missing. Miss Harris was the cost of a show given on the ship.

The party was searching for George Delahay, pilot of a flying boat which was wrecked in the storm Monday.

ZONE AREA URGED IN PORTLAND FARE FUSS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20.—(AP) Establishment of zone areas within which reduced street car fares would be offered was recommended today by John A. Beeler, nationally known traction and transportation expert, as a solution to the street car fare problem in Portland and other cities.

Somebody left a three-weeks-old baby in Lawrence Rutrio's car, parked on Mason street, Greenwich, Con. The child was neatly dressed, and it was pinned this note, in disguised handwriting: "This baby is a Catholic. Baptize it, please. I have no home for it. See it will be taken care of. Thanks."

There is a sad story back of that note, and it is not hard to guess what it is.

The baby will be baptized and cared for. Anybody adopting it would have, in all probability, a little girl to be proud of.

William the Conqueror and Leonardo Da Vinci were both babies of that kind, their mothers not married, although the Duke of Normandy later married Arietta, the tanner's daughter, mother of the boy who became the Conqueror.

Leonardo's father never married the peasant mother of his great artist son. The social gap was too great. Instead, he married a woman of the nobility and Leonardo had the pleasure of supporting his half brothers and sisters.

Federal Judge Hopkins of Kansas came to New York, sent "Legs" Diamond, bootlegger, to jail for four years, fining him \$11,000, then went back remarking, "New York in the way of crime is worse than Chicago."

He also hurt New Yorkers' feelings by saying that, enduring all kinds of crime, they reminded him of a dog lying on an ant's nest, too lazy to move when the ants bite him.

The gangsters of New York do all they can to justify the judge's opinions. Yesterday they killed two men near New York's police headquarters, spraying the streets with bullets.
