

OREGON POULTRY INDUSTRY SIGHTS FAIR DAY AHEAD

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis.—(Special.) The signal for a fair track ahead is given the Oregon poultry business in the final publication of results and conclusions drawn from the three-year survey of cost and efficiency in commercial egg production in this state made by the management and poultry departments of the experiment station. These results have just been published as station bulletin No. 287 by D. Scudder, A. S. Burrier, A. G. Adams and J. Knowlton. This bulletin constitutes a veritable economic code for the Oregon poultrymen, and by reason of formulae given, it even be adapted to changing conditions developing since the survey was made.

The composite chicken flock of 441 hens studied for the years 1928-29 produced 271,337 hens producing 1,651,651 dozen eggs, or an average production of 171 eggs. Total cost of egg production for the years 1928-29 was 27.7 cents per dozen and the average market price of eggs was 24.6 cents per dozen. On the basis of lowered feed and labor costs in 1930, the authors estimate the average cost of production of eggs a dozen less in that year than for the three years of the survey.

The study revealed that it is likely possible to take advantage of the cost of production methods available in Oregon because of natural and artificial advantages for commercial egg production. These enable poultrymen to meet competition successfully and justify expansion of the enterprise, say the authors.

The commercial egg enterprise ranks fifth among the agricultural enterprises of this state, due to rapid growth and expansion in the last 15 years, yet the total egg production of Oregon amounts to but 1 per cent of the total for this country. In 1930 99 per cent of the Oregon surplus was marketed through one central organization, and because of superior quality and pack these commanded premium prices on the largest markets in the country.

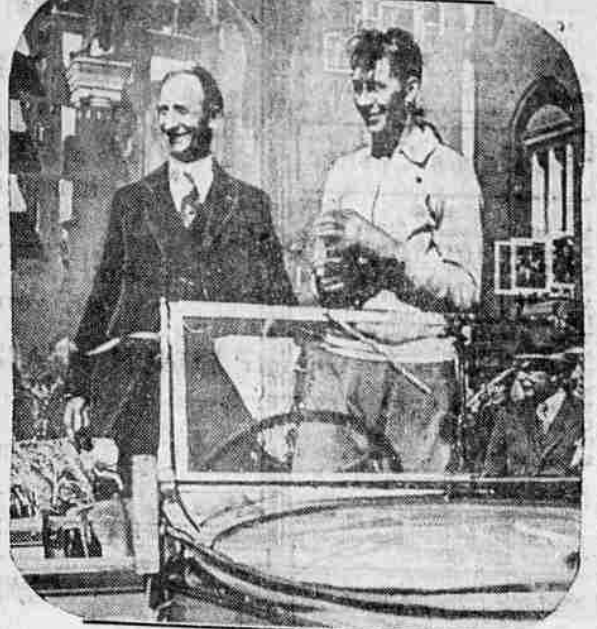

MUSSOLINI GARB PROVIDES SHOCK FOR PUNCTILIOUS

Duce Dictates Own Raiment for Most Occasions—Comfort First Aim—Is Fond of Fascist Uniform

By Hamilton Whitman. ROME.—(AP)—Mussolini is the despair of his tailor because he won't be bound by sartorial regulations. He can be brilliantly correct in dress when necessary, but usually he prefers to be comfortable. Many a visitor accustomed to the punctilious formality of costume sacred to European diplomacy has had a tailor-made shock at the Palazzo Venezia.

Instead of the black coat and striped trousers which are almost a uniform for European statesmen, the Duce meets his interviewers in the most informal of attire. When the American secretary of state called on him recently the leader of fascism wore a white flannel suit, crumpled by the day's work and a soft blue shirt. It is his favorite hot weather costume.

At other times he shows up at his office in riding breeches and boots. As a gesture toward convention he often combines this with a wing collar and a dark jacket. At other times he affects a small Basque beret and sport clothes cut something after the English mode.

Another favorite embellishment is a white yachting cap. He was recently photographed at 5:30 a. m. as he started the round Italy air race wearing white trousers, dark coat and white topped yachting cap.

Like many Italians he prefers his coats double breasted. Has State Uniform. Despite this liking for various combinations that sometimes seem strange to non-Italian visitors, Mussolini can and does suppress his sartorial enthusiasms when the cares of state demand.

As prime minister he is entitled to wear a highly ornamental uniform at state functions. He often

turns out in it, with plumed hat, braided tunic and sabre. At other times the "tight and cylinder" as the morning coat and silk hat are known here, meet his fancy. His favorite dress, however, is his uniform as honorary corporal in the fascist militia.

Symbol of Power. Cut of grey-green cloth it consists of riding breeches and an open collared tunic with patch pockets worn over the famous black shirt. Black boots and the black felt fez, folded to form a small cap something like the over-seas U. S. dough-boys used to wear, complete the uniform.

In it the Duce reviews his black-shirt cohorts, exhorts them from the balcony of the Venezia Palace or rewards them for outstanding deeds in the service of fascism. It is a symbol of the force which led him to his present place and he seems to have a fondness for it above all other costumes in his wardrobe.

ALPHONSO'S PALACE WILL BE MUSEUM UNDER NEW RULE

MADRID.—(AP)—The plumed and corseted shades of Castilian princes haunting the royal palaces of Madrid are not to be molested by the presence of republican politicians. One of the first acts of the constituent assembly under the republic was to set aside the royal palace as a museum.

The presidential palace of the new republic will be located elsewhere. Designed by Filippo Juvara in 1735 and erected by Giovanni Battista Sacchetti, 1738-64, the former abode of Alfonso XIII is an impressive sight. It follows the general architectural scheme of a justica base surmounted by a six-story upper portion with Corinthian pilasters.

Among its treasures is one of Spain's greatest boasts—the royal collection of 6,000 pieces of tapestry. They are of Gothic, Arabic and other origins, woven in gold, silk and linen thread. There is also a world-renowned collection of arms and armor. Here the famous "Toledo blade" of mediaeval times is shown to advantage.
