ROGUE RIVER FIRE MENACES VILLAGE BEFORE CONTROL

Many Homes Saved by Hard Work of Fighters—No New Outbreaks Reported in Crater National

Most of the forest fire danger the past few days has been on state protected land in the south part of the county, and there was also one in the Brownboro section.

The most threatening fire was that about a quarter of a mile from the town of Rogue River, which swept over many acres, which the district fire warden's force, aided by many volunteer fire fighters from the town, beat back. Had a wind risen the town, which was practically surrounded by fire at a distance, would have been endangered.

The Oscar Shepherd and Horton homes were greatly endangered, and owing to the diligent efforts of the fire fighters many homes north and south of the river were saved. The fire was gotten under control yesterday.

Canyon Fire Held

A fire also started in Dead Horse canyon also started yesterday at 4 p. m., between Evans creek and Wards creek, and the canyon fire covered about 100 acres, but was controlled about 6 a. m. next day.

Still another fire of day before yesterday was that at Gold Hill mountain, originating at 3 p. m., and covering an area of about 15 acres before controlled at 8 p. m.

On Wednesday evening a forest fire started on Obenchain mountain near Brownboro and burned over about 80 acres, mostly in brush, before getting under control the following morning.

Up to early afternoon today no new fires had been reported, in Crater National forest for several days past, and no new ones had originated on state protected land in this district since Thursday.

LOTTERY STORIES WILL BE BANNED ON PRESS WIRES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The Associated Press, International News Service and United Press have assured the postoffice department they will cooperate fully in its effort to free the mails of unlawful matter concerning sweepstakes lotteries. The announcement was made today by Arch Coleman, acting postmaster-general. It said: "These news associations hereafter will not distribute to their members and clients matter relating to sweepstakes lotteries either in stories or photographs—just as they always have refrained from handling matter relating to the numerous other kinds of foreign lotteries patronized by players in this country."

DELIBERATE LONG BEFORE AWARDED VERDICT FOR \$100

What is asserted to be the longest continuous justice court civil suit trial session in Medford before a jury was completed at 12:30 last night without adjournment, from the time the trial began at 10 a. m. yesterday, except for dinner and supper, the jury returned a verdict of \$100 in favor of the plaintiff.

The trial which was also notable for the number of well-known citizens involved as litigants, witnesses, jurors and the like, consisted of the suit by H. W. Hall, contractor, against C. F. Reichstein for \$104.00 for extras and labor with interest at 6 per cent from May 9, 1931, alleged due for extras and labor over the agreed contract price of \$1783 for building a dwelling at 440 Front street. Reichstein had entered a counter claim of \$247.39 damages against Hall for alleged faults in construction and not completing the building in time as per the contract agreement.

The case was tried before Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor, both sides demanding a jury trial with the jurors drawn from the regular jury panel. The trial was held in the circuit court room of the court house.

The jury considered the case, but half an hour before reaching a verdict, and court was in practically continuous session from 10 a. m. to 12:30 p. m., with time out only for another day.

Rawles Moore was attorney for the plaintiff, and F. J. Newman, attorney for the defendant.

The jurors were E. C. Gaddis, foreman, J. C. Brown, C. H. Howell, H. G. Shearer, John G. White and V. J. Emerick.

LOCAL MEN BUILD WIRELESS PHONE FOR LOWER WAVE

Another field of radio transmission will be entered this fall by two Medford radio men. An amateur radio-telephone transmitting station will be owned by Vert Walker and constructed by Victor Milnes. The station will have a night range of approximately 1000 miles and will be operated on 3517 kilocycles.

The station's power has not been definitely decided but will probably be of 50 watt rating. Milnes now owns and operates the amateur radio transmitter W6ZZD located on Narrigan street with a power of 45 watts. However it is for code operation only.

The new phone station will operate on Milnes' call letters, W6ZZD until another station license is obtained from the radio commission. The station is expected to be on the air for tests about the middle of September. Broadcast receivers fitted with short wave converters will be able to hear the station if tuned to 80 meters.
