

BABE BANGS OUT 600TH HOMER OF BIG TIME CAREER

Eighteen Years of Play Bring Mark Never Before Attained by Major Player — Hit Starts Yank Rally

Babe Ruth has made 600 home runs in his major league career. In the third inning of the Yankees-St. Louis game yesterday he drove one of George Blaholder's offerings far over the bleacher roof at Sportsman's park. It was his 35th four-bagger of the current season and brought his total for the 18 years of his major league career up to 600, a mark never before attained or even threatened by any other major leaguer. The Babe reclaimed the pellet from the youngster who found it out in Grand Boulevard, giving in exchange \$10 reward and a new autographed ball.

His starts rally.

The homer started the Yanks off to the winning rally in their 11-7 victory over the Browns. Lou Gehrig duplicated the feat a moment later and before the inning was over the Yanks had five runs and the game safely tucked away.

Philadelphia's champion athletics and the Chicago White Sox hammered out a tie between them and although the Sox had a 14-10 edge in the hitting, Philadelphia won 15 to 12.

Washington's batters rained out a total of 15 hits off Clint Brown and Pete Jablonowski to take the fourth game of the series from the Cleveland, 6 to 3.

Wicks and Errors Aid.

Boston and Detroit produced fewer hits in their clash but seven bases on balls off Eddie Durham and Willy Moore more than made up for the absence of blows and the Red Sox tossed in five errors to make things easy for the Tigers to walk off with an 11 to 5 triumph. Yesterday's defeats left Boston and Chicago tied for sixth place, 37 games behind the Athletics and with 37 to play. They still have their mathematical chance to win the pennant, however, as the A's have 39 to go.

Only one game in the National league survived a spell of threatening weather. In it, the Boston Braves took a close battle from the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2 to 1.

Fishing in Crater lake and Diamond lake has improved greatly during the cooler weather of the past two weeks, it is reported. Limit catches are being taken at each of the places. Many tourists are availing themselves of fishing in Crater lake since fishing licenses are not required in the national park.

One party of tourists report catching four trout within an hour. All measured between 18 and 20 inches. The Crater lake limit is five fish.

Base fishing at Lake o' the Woods is said to be at its best either early in the morning or late in the evening just before dark. Many local fishermen prefer the bass because they are such a delicious pan fish.

Some trout are being taken from Rogue river now on eggs and flies. The California bucktail fly, tied locally by an Ashland man, is said to be the favorite of the river fish just now.

Reports from Warden F. M. Brown at the mouth of the Rogue river state that a few steelhead and some salmon are beginning to come into the stream. Because of the unusually low condition of the Rogue, the fish are not coming upstream fast, Mr. Brown states. Instead, they are gathering at the mouths of tributary streams along where the water is cooler.

Mr. Brown says the water in the Rogue is lower now than was ever known before.
