

DEMPSEY SMEARS PORK AND BEANS ALL OVER ARENA

Drops Big Negro In First Round Of Portland Show—Second Foe Likewise—Toys With Two Others.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 25.—(AP)—Seventeen thousand eight hundred and sixty-four persons paid \$27,295.50 last night to see Jack Dempsey in a four-round exhibition, admittedly the second step of his attempt to climb back to the championship. And judging by the ovation given him, the Multnomah civic stadium throng will be with him all the way.

Bull carrying a little extra flesh, the ex-champion showed speed and the power was not gone from his left.

It showed in the first two rounds. Dempsey wore big gloves. The right one dropped Big Bill Hartwell, Boston negro, for a nine count, then the left hit him on the side of the head and Hartwell took the count, the whole fracas lasting a little more than one minute.

McKee Lasts Quick

The left did for Dave McKee, Tulsa, in less than a minute. Denny Lenheart, Portland, boxed and swapped punches with the mauler for the next two rounds. The local boy placed a couple to the jaw and then made Dempsey expend himself for a time, but the latter didn't seem to mind the pace.

Dempsey completely won the spectators when it was announced he would take on the fourth opponent provided for him in an extra two rounds. Bob Marlee, Portland, stayed the course, too, though Dempsey staggered him once.

The ex-champion goes from here to Seattle where he is billed for the third exhibition of his tour Wednesday night.

COAST PITCHERS PROVE WORTH IN MAJOR LEAGUES

Gomez Turns In 16th Victory Of Season In Yankee Uniform—Mahaffey Wins 14th For Athletics.

A spindly left-hander and a tall right hand sharpshooter, both from the finishing school of the Pacific Coast league, are proving better and better arguments, as the season wears on, in favor of the fancy prices the west coast youngsters command in the major league baseball market.

Consider the left-hander, Vernon Gomez, late of the San Francisco Seals, polished a bit last season in St. Paul, and now ace of the Yankee pitching staff. In a year when the Yank hurling eccentricities have sent peppery Joe McCarthy, Yankee pilot, home to mope over his vicarious, Gomez has been the savior of many a good evening meal.

Wins 16th Game Yesterday he turned in his 16th victory of the season, an 8 to 5 conquest of the Chicago White Sox that ran the Yankee winning streak to six, a new high for the team this season.

The right hander, Leroy Mahaffey of Connie Mack's staff of world champion Athletics, turned in an even more stylish performance to win his fourteenth victory of the season against only two defeats. The 1929 graduate from Portland, Ore., limited the St. Louis Browns to five hits while the A's were betting Sammy Gray. Goose Goslin's 20th homer cost Leroy a shutout.

Detroit pulled up out of the American league cellar and the White Sox were plunked to the bottom as the Tigers noosed out Washington in a free hitting struggle, 9 to 5. The Tigers reached the heights of sixth place when the Boston Red Sox crumbled under Cleveland's pounding, 11 to 7, and fell back a notch ahead of Chicago.

Many Rained Out But the battle of the New York Giants and Chicago Cubs for second place in the National league and as far as results were concerned that double-header might as well have gone overboard too. The Cubs piled on Clarence Mitchell for five runs in the fourth inning of the first game and picked up three more to win for Bob Smith, 8 to 4.

In the second game, however, Bill Terry hit his second homer of the day, this time in the ninth inning with the score tied one-one, and he broke up a pitching tussle between Guy Bush and Freddy Fitzsimmons to give the Giants a 2 to 1 victory.

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KELLY ON JOB AS GAME SUPERVISOR

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 25.—(AP)—H. L. Kelly has returned from Hawaii to take up his new duties as Oregon state game supervisor.

Kelly will make his home with his mother, Mrs. Catherine Abbott Kelly, at Oregon City.

Well-stocked streams and forests will be Kelly's goal in his new work, he said.

"We not only want to build up the streams and forests for the hunters and fishermen now, but for the accommodation of three or four times the present number," he said.
