DEALERS SEEKING POULTRY SUPPLY

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 26.—(AP)—Scramble of killers for live chicken supplies is causing intense strength all through the local poultry trade. In fact the strength is practically general along the entire Pacific slope. It appears primarily due to the sharp advance in California prices recently, and especially those of San Francisco. There is practically no change in the market for butter here. On the produce exchange as well as on the open market, sales are much in line with supplies. Generally maintained prices are reported in the market for strictly fresh eggs although some alleged fresh stock is being sold at discounts of 1 to 2c from the list. Generally slower trade tone is reflected in the market for country killed hogs. While the upper price limits are still available in a small way general sales are lower.

JUDGE LECTURES PHOENIX FOEMEN; DISMISSES CASE

At the trial of J. C. Berang, 60, proprietor of The Covered Wagon, refreshment establishment at Phoenix, on the charge of assault and battery on Sam Edwards, which latter episode created so much excitement in Phoenix last Sunday, Judge Taylor in the justice court here this forenoon after hearing the testimony dismissed the charge against Berang, holding that in law there could be no such charge against the defendant.

However, the judge lectured both, dividing the responsibility, and obtained a promise from each that there would be no further trouble between them, and that each would cease alleged annoyances against the other. The arguments of Assistant Deputy District Attorney George Neilson, representing the state and of E. E. Kelly, representing Berang, were also along the line that further trouble between the two men should be avoided.

The testimony showed that there had been bad feeling between Berang and Edwards, whose homes are not much over 60 feet apart, with the old county road running between them, for a long time past, which culminated in Sunday's altercation. That day Edwards was assisting a man named Lewis drive a herd of cattle by when Berang's dog ran out into the road in front of the latter's house. Edwards threw a stone at the animal. This so angered the chief man that he ordered Edwards away from the vicinity of his property, and Edwards picking up a stone threw it at Berang, hitting him in the back.

Then Berang picked up the same stone and hurled it at Edwards, the missile injuring his head and jaw.
